

General Assembly. Under provisions of an act passed late in the 1959 session, the Kings Mountain board of commissioners is authorized to

call an election on the question. However, a favorable vote wouldn't make employment of a city manager mandatory, as the statute empowers the mission to designate the duly-

elected mayor as city manager. The citizens would vote for or against a modified "Plan D" city manager system, in which the board of commissioners would retain their rights to appoint the city attorney, treasurer, clerk, judge and other employment au-

thority.
