

Generally, Kings Mountain, the most part dependent on tex-tiles and in lesser degree on mining, found the economy soft. A slump in textiles began to be apparent in the summer and the remainder of the year pro-

duced no improvement The textile industry, for years contending that imports of foreign textiles have been hurting the industry are hopeful that a new national administration will lend a more willing ear to pleas for protection.

However, the attitude of most is hopeful.
