Blalock, Chairman for the Agri-cultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Under the mobile dryer loan

program, which was started in 1949, farmers may borrow from the Commodity Credit Corporation to finance the cost of drying equipment such as mobile me chanical dryers, air circulators, ventilators, tunnels and fans for conditioning storage crops. The new provision will enable farmers to borrow up to 95 percent of the cost of this equipment. Pre-viously, loans were limited to 75



They want to control city politics, but they are not willing to live in the city and pay city taxes like everybody else.

Garland Still: Mr. Still is good at making promises and some of them would suit me fine, too, IF the city could afford them. Mr. Still, of course, does not seem to consider the fact that such policies may be recommended by him, but that the decision will rest completely with the board of commissioners. He might get to vote—if there were a tie to break.

I have worked hard to do a good job as Mayor and I believe the citizens can see the results of eight years of progressive, financially sound city improvements.

I want your vote and support and pledge another two years of fairness to all and continuing city progress.
