Mrs. Neal, Mrs. Hamrick Attend Reading Clinic

Mrs. Ernest W. Neal and Mrs. David Hamrick, two teachers on the faculty of Trinity Day School, attended a reading clinic in Glen Rock, New Jersey, on May 4 and 5.

The teachers were sent by Trinity Day School to study the widely publicized method of reading known as the Carden Method.

This method, developed by Miss Mae Carden, who led the clinic in New Jersey, deals with reading from a phonics approach and emphasizes reading in thought groups rather than one word at a time. It is a method whereby the students are taught to think about what they are reading rather than to focus their attention merely on words themselves, without understanding what the words are saying. The method also incorporates spelling and vocabulary.

The clinic was attended by teachers from many states, including public and private school systems.

Trinity Day School plans to put this method into effect in its classes and thereby add to the extensive phonics work already being done in the school.

The school is also making plans to sponsor, under the auspices of the Episcopal School Association, Miss Carden in a similar reading clinic in this area sometime in the future and to make this clinic available to all interested persons.

Teachers Complete Art Workshop

Fifty Kings Mountain area teachers received certificates following a three-day art workshop last Friday.

They tried out art techniques, learning more about modern creative art education and some of its materials and tools during a 15-hour course held at West School.

All of the art workshop activities will be experiences which the teachers can relate to their own classroom teaching.

Uses of water colors, poster paints, finger paints, colored chalks, modeling clay and crayons were demonstrated in the rows and rows of artwork on display in the classroom and hall of the elementary school.

The workshop was led by Mrs. Jane Calloway, who has taught extensively and holds a master's degree from Columbia University. She is now art consultant for Binney & Smith, Inc., manufacturers of school art supplies which offers the course as a free educational service, particularly
