Plastics Line To Be Marketed By Celanese

NEW YORK — Plans to make and market a diversified line of plastics in Japan were announced jointly here today by Celanese Corporation of America and Rainipon Celluloid Company (Daicell).

Products to be produced and marketed will include the Celanese acetal co-polymer known as Celcon in this country. This high-performance plastic will be sold under the trademark Duracon in Japan. Other products will cover a wide range of cellulosic films and sheets.

Application will be made to the Japanese Government for the necessary approvals of the two companies' plans which include formation of a manufacturing company and construction of plants in Japan. The plants will have an annual production capacity of more than 16 million pounds of acetal co-polymer and approximately 5 million pounds of cellulosic plastics.

Meanwhile joint operations will begin in Japan immediately with the establishment of Polyplastics Company Limited as an import - marketing organization handling principally the acetal co-polymer plastic which is replacing metals in automobile parts, appliances pipe containers and many other applications.

Polyplastics Company will be supplied with the plastic from Celanese production at Bishop, Texas.

The agreement between the two major chemical companies calls for extensive use of Celanese technology by the planned jointly owned manufacturing company. In addition to Duracon the proposed plant will manufacture acetate and sheet using Celanese methods for casting and extruding these products for such growth markets as sound recording tapes and transparent plastic packaging.

It is also planned that Celanese will license technology to Daicell for the manufacture and sale of cellulose acetate flake and molding powder and cellulose propionate flake and molding powder. These molding powders are used for production of packaging materials, pens, telephones, appliance housings and many other products.
