Lance New Area Navy Recruiter

Chief Boilermaker, Harry G. Lance reported Monday, July 30, 1962, to the Shelby Navy Recruiting Station to relieve Chief Appel as the Navy Recruiter for Cleveland and Rutherford Counties. Chief Appel is being transferred to the Navy Recruiting Station in Greenville, S. C.

Chief Lance enlisted in the Navy in Asheville in December, 1951 and attained his present rate of chief petty officer in 1960. He is a veteran of the Korean conflict and holds the following campaign decorations: The Good Conduct Medal with two subsequent awards, Korean Service Medal with two stars, United Nations Medal, China Service Medal, Navy Occupation Medal and National Defense Medal.

Accompanying Chief Lance to Shelby is his wife, the former Miss Norma Griffin of Asheville and their sons, Chuck, two, and Chris, one. They will reside in Shelby at 800 Churchill Drive.

Prior to his transfer to Shelby, Chief Lance was stationed in Norfolk, Va., on the Staff of Commander, Destroyer Force, United States Atlantic Fleet.

As the Area Navy Recruiter, Chief Lance will be available for counseling to all schools of Cleveland and Rutherford Counties about the opportunities offered by the Naval Service. His present itinerary takes him to Forest City on Tuesdays, Rutherfordton on Thursdays, Kings Mountain on Fridays, and of the Recruiting Office in Shelby on Mondays and Wednesdays.

Four Not Guilty Of Affray Charge

Four Kings Mountain youths were acquitted on charges of affray, two being found guilty of charges of carrying a concealed weapon in Monday's session of city Recorder's Court.

The charges resulted from an alleged incident wherein a group of Kings Mountain boys invaded the Negro section to retaliate for a reported incident wherein a white youth was beaten by a Negro.

The story was told by arresting officer B. P. Cook.

Officer Cook said the police department had a call on the first beating on July 24 and got the report there would be trouble the following night.

The entire police force was called together and the proposed fight in the colored section nipped in the bud.

On later patrols, the officer stopped a car on King Street in which Larry F. Vassy, of Route 1; Jerry Lee Marlow, of Route 2; and Steve T. Moore, of 313 Fairview Street, were passengers.

A large pocket knife, a lug wrench, and several chains were found in the car, Cook reported. He said after questioning the boys he charged Vassy and Marlow with affray and Moore with affray and carrying a concealed weapon.

Moore, Cook reported, had a chain in his pocket.

Cook said he did not see the boys in the Negro section at the time of the investigation there.

James B. Harrison, of 407 Cherry Street, was arrested by Cook as Harrison walked along Deal Street.

Cook said Harrison has a homemade blackjack in his possession.

Harrison was charged with carrying a concealed weapon and affray.

Judge Jack White found the four not guilty of affray, but handed stiff sentences to Harrison and Moore on the concealed weapon charge.

Each was sentenced to two years, suspended upon the conditions they be of good behavior for two years and not violate any of the laws of North Carolina for the period, pay \$100 fine each and the costs of court, and the weapons be destroyed.

Judge White ordered that warrants be issued for two others involved in the case, both minors, for carrying a concealed weapon.

Both were to be transferred to the juvenile authorities for trial.

Other Dispositions:

Donald Sanders, 316 W. Ridge Street, larceny (non-compliance with a sentence rendered some months ago), told to pay the cost of the merchandise taken from Home Savings & Loan Association in full in a week or the sentence will be put into effect.

George "Buster" Hope, Jr., 102 E. Gold Street, non-compliance with a non-support sentence, told to pay fifty percent of this week's paycheck to apply on the amount behind in payments and come into court Monday for instructions on paying the balance.

Charles Cook, 213 City Street, non-compliance with a violation of the prohibition law sentence, 90 day sentence made active.

Cook was also given a four month's active sentence on a charge of resisting arrest and a 90 day active sentence on an assault on a female count.

Ray H. Hollifield, 413 Baker Street, reckless driving, 30 days, suspended upon payment of a \$10 fine and the costs of court and the conditions he not violate any North Carolina motor vehicle laws for 30 days.

Fred Lee Wright, Ridge Street, non-support, nol prossed.

Gerald Lutz, Bessemer City, non-support, 9 months suspended upon payment of \$10 weekly for support, and payment of the costs of court. The costs were remitted.

CHANGES IN YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Q — Suppose I can't do my regular job but could do some lighter work, could I then qualify?

A — No, if you are able to do other substantial gainful work you will not meet the eligibility requirements under the disability provisions of the social security law.

Q — I am still in college and studying for the ministry. When should I file my waiver certificate?

A — You must file a waiver by the date of your tax return for the second taxable year you have net earnings of \$400 or more, some portion of which is from the exercise of your ministry (including salary, fees, or honoraria you receive as a minister, member of a religious order, or Christian Science practitioner).

Q — I am 57 years old and had to stop working 7 months ago because of a severe disability. Are there any provisions under the social security law in cases like mine?

A — Yes, you may be eligible for monthly social security disability benefits, and certain members of your family may also be paid monthly benefits.

Q — I have heard that a worker who is disabled may now get social security disability payments. I would like to know how disabled you must be to collect.

A — You must have a condition which shows up in a medical examination or test and is so severe that you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work. If you can no longer work at your regular job but still can do other substantial gainful work, you probably will not qualify under the disability provisions. Your condition must be one that has lasted for 6 months or more and is expected to continue for a long and indefinite time.
