The Veterans Corner

Here are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to questions from former servicemen and their families:

Q -- What is the function of the overseas Veterans Affairs Offices of the State Department?

A -- These offices at the American embassies in London, Paris, Rome, Mexico City and at the American consulate general in Frankfurt, Germany, furnish assistance to United States veterans and their dependents on the full range of veterans benefits matters, including authorization of VA medical treatment and hospitalization benefits for eligible veterans.

J -- What states have paid a bonus to veterans of World War II?

A -- States that have paid a bonus to veterans of World War II are Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia.

Q -- Has any pension ever been granted to veterans of World War I?

A -- World War I veterans are eligible for service-connected compensation payments and for non-service-connected pension payments. The compensation payments are paid for disabilities from injury or disease incurred or aggravated during active service, and are not related to the income or the financial status of the veteran. Pension payments on the other hand are made to veterans of World War I who are permanently and totally disabled from reasons not traceable to service provided their income is less than the limits set by the existing pension laws.

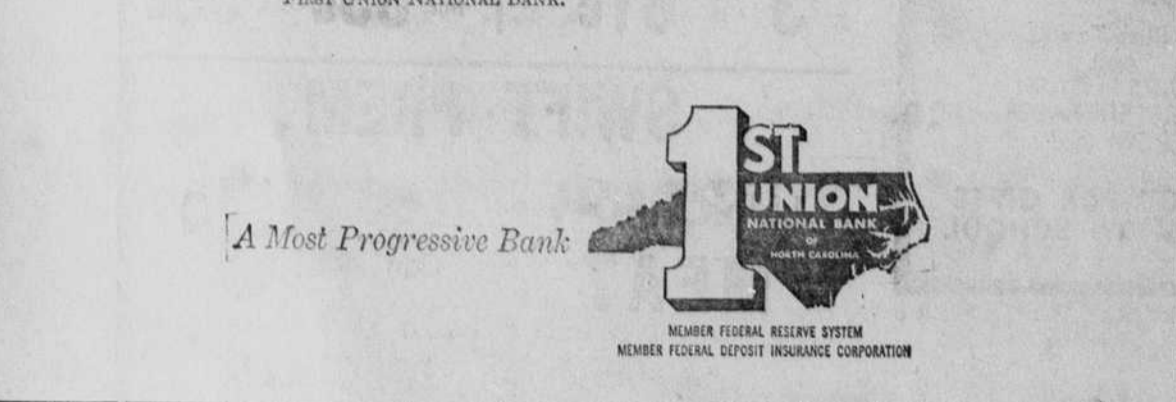
