

Dixon Candidacy **Poses Replay** Of '61 Campaign By MARTIN HARMON

ing re-election to a second term. The Mayor filed his candidacy and paid the filing fee Wednesday morning.

The candidiacy of Mayor Dixon poses a re-match of the 1961 campaign, when Mr.. Dixon unseated veteran Mayor Glee A. Bridges in a run-off election by the margin of 116 votes out of 2210 cast. Ex-Mayor E dges filed his candidacy exactly a month previously, on February

Mr. Dixon's candidacy was the lone one of the past week. J. E. (Zip) Rhea, Ward 5 commissioner, has filed for re-election, and George H. Mauney has filed as a candidate for the Kings Mountain board of educa-

Mayor Dixon said, "I am seeking another term because I am interested in seeing through to completion several projects now underway. It has been a very pleasant and rewarding two years." The Mayor mentioned specifically the re - vamping of the electrical system and the outdoor re - lighting of the business district as projects he wants to see completed.

Besides continuing city policy of heavy attention to street improvements, including paving curb-and-gutter and sidewalk in stallations, the Dixon Administration also made a major expansion of the natural gas distribution system.

Mayor Dixon is a Kings Mounam ounding contractor and lay minister of the Baptist church Commenting on his church rela-tionships, Mr. Dixon laughed that he was something of a hyrid, having been born and rear ed a Baptist, and having married a Methodist. .

Age 61. Mayor Dixon is a Kings Mountain native. His first foray into politics was in 1960 as Republican candidate 10. United States Representative. The following spring he entered the mayoral campaign, the upcoming election marking his third time to place his name on an election ballot .

The Mayor lives at 209 North Siims street. Mrs. Dixon is the former Blanche Patterson and grand-children.


