In an effort to speed up their processing, Sgt. May has sliced through red tape and simplified procedures. It is now possible to take all enlistment tests locally without the necessity of traveling to Recruiting Headquarters. Although it is still necessary to travel to Recruiting Headquarters in Charlotte for physical examination and interview, it is now possible to schedule this at the convenience of the applicant.

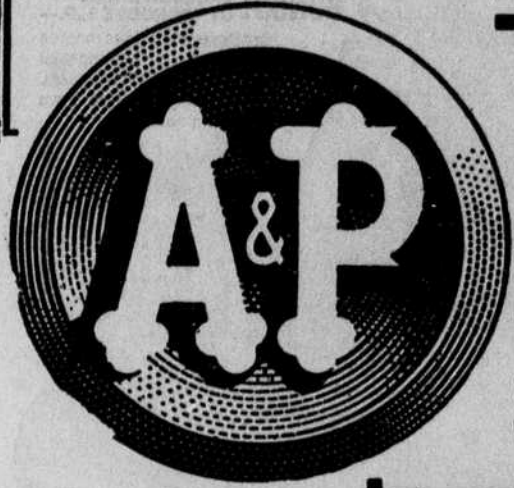
