


Mr. Teschler said the new firm hopes its additional 33,000 square teet of floor space will be completed and machinery in opera-tica soon after January 1. Present employment of 80 is expected to double.



Confirming the merger, President Lazare noted the merger was effected in the summer but that confirmation had been withheld previously "in order to a void confusion on the part of vola confusion on the part of customers, some of whom were buying from both companies". 


