Throughout the state, North Carolina's total public schools bill from the nine months school fund was \$217,716,803.

Major portion of the money was expended for teacher salaries, which totaled \$718,278. Other items of state fund conthis tions to operation of the nine-plant Kings Mountain sys-

tem were: For plant operation \$38,145; fixed charges (for compensation of school employees) \$72.75; and for auxiliary agencies (libraries and the child health program) 55830. General control, including stile appropriations for the superintendent's office, was \$15,229 Among individual's state-paid salaries were: Supt. B. N. Barnes, \$10,920; Miss Alice Aver itt, teaching supervisor, \$6660; Principal Harry Jaynes, \$8350; Principal L. L. Adams, \$7510; and Principal Connie Allison, \$6430.

The \$718,278 in teacher pay went to 148 teachers and principals, including 101 elementary teachers (78 white, 23 colored) 38 high school teachers (31 white, seven colored), seven elementary principals (six white, one colored), and two high school principals (one white, one colored). The state provided \$21,900 for janitor wages, \$7640 for fuel, and \$4773 for water, light, and power.
