### Coffee Cake Ideal For Cold Mornings

There is nothing friendlier than an invitation to coffee. It needn't be a formal afternoon party with fancy sandwiches and the silver service. A relaxing, informal gathering in mid-morning - when a mother can really enjoy that second cup of coffee - is the warmest way to entertain old friends or introduce new ones to the neighbors.

Instead of a traditional coffee ring or rounds of doughnuts or buns, serve these delicious little individual coffee cakes. It takes so little time and effort to make them. That's why miniature coffee cakes are particularly fine for church or club coffees too.

### INDIVIDUAL COFFEE CAKES:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 1/4 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup chopped walnut meats
- Cream shortening. Add 1 cup sugar gradually and cream thoroughly. Beat egg yolks. Add to first mixture. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt and add alternately with milk. Beat egg whites stiff but not dry. Fold in. Pour into well-greased individual pie pans. Mix 1/2 cup sugar with cinnamon and chopped walnut nut meats. Sprinkle over batter. Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees, F. 20 to 25 minutes. Serve hot.

Yield: eight.

### Children's Home Has Successful Drive

GREENSBORO, N. C. - A successful December fund-raising campaign was reported today by the Children's Home Society of North Carolina.

Just over \$66,000 was received in answer to the Society's traditional Christmas season appeal, said William D. Snider of Greensboro, Society president.

"We want to say 'Thank you' to the many North Carolinians who responded to our appeal," he said. "These generous contributions will help assure a 'Happy New Year' for the homeless babies and children who come into our care."

While the December solicitation lagged at the start, it ended ahead of the previous year when contributions totaled some \$58,800.

"The rising demand for the Society's services, and the continuing climb of costs, made it necessary that our budget be increased in order to hold our work to its customary high standards," Snider explained. "I am hopeful we shall not have to say 'no' to requests for our aid in the year ahead."

The Society is a child-caring and adoption planning agency which gives its services statewide without charge. Its support is entirely voluntary. Through Carolinas United, the Society receives support from United Fund drives in a number of Tar Heel communities.

The children's Home Society is a local project of the Junior Woman's Club.
