Chicken Topp Plentiful Food List
Plan to put chicken on the table often during February. It tops the plentiful food list for the month.
Also featured are pecans, which are in record supply this year, reports Miss Gaynelle Hogan, consumer marketing specialist for the Agriculture Extension Service at N. C. State. The 1963 crop report indicates production at 280 million pounds.
Add to this the other plentiful — beef, pork, canned corn, potatoes, canned ripe olives and apples — and you have lots of good, inexpensive eating during February.

Miss Hogan says the array of meat items is broad and generous. The U. S. Department of Agriculture statisticians say that 10 per cent more broiler fryers will be marketed during the month than a year ago. Beef supplies, they say, will also be 10 per cent above year earlier levels and will continue large for the next few months.
Also look for record supplies of pork — chops, roasts and hams. Along with this selection of red meats and poultry, homemakers will have no trouble with menu planning during February. To round out their meals, there are the always plentiful potatoes.
Supplies of canned corn remain at record levels. Prices at the retail markets are favorable so now is a good time to serve corn often and to stock the pantry shelves.

And for an extra touch to your menu, serve canned ripe olives. There is a record supply and prices should be reasonable.

Clubwomen Help Testing Program
Some 20,000 North Carolina clubwomen are being asked to help officials obtain chemical testing programs for drunk drivers in communities throughout the state.
Mrs. James M. Harper, Jr. of Southport, president of the N. C. Federation of Women's Clubs, has written more than 300 local presidents.
Her letter suggests these steps:
1) Combine with all women's clubs in the community to learn about North Carolina's chemical testing law.
2) As a united front investigate the local official's plans to initiate a testing program.
3) If local governments cannot afford the cost of machines or of sending personnel for free training, raise the necessary funds.
4) Voice support for testing so the program will be applied consistently.
The State Highway Patrol has announced it will offer the test to persons accused of driving under the influence only where the test is available from local law enforcement units.
Mrs. Peggie Sharpe, Women's Field Representative of the N. C. Traffic Safety Council, said that about one half of the nation's drivers killed in accidents had been drinking.
A new North Carolina law passed by the 1963 General Assembly states that a person is presumed to be under the influence when the alcohol in his blood reaches 10 per cent.
The law specifies that breath is the only bodily substance to be tested by law enforcement officers. The breath testing instruments cost about \$600, Mrs. Sharpe said.
Operators for chemical testing devices must complete 44 hours of instruction. The training is being conducted at Industrial Educational Centers without charge. Local governments would pay only for the travel, food and lodging of personnel during the week-long course, Mrs. Sharpe said.
Mrs. Harper's letter comes in the wake of the first statewide women's safety seminar held in Raleigh Wednesday.
More than 300 women civic leaders met in conjunction with the Third Annual Meeting of the N. C. Traffic Safety Council. Chemical testing was one of the areas emphasized during the presentation of North Carolina's plan to reduce accidents, Mrs. Sharpe said.
