## Winn-Dixie Notes Sales Increases

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—Sales recorded by Winn-Dixie Stores during the 28-week period ended January 11 showed an increase of 1.16 percent over the corresponding period a year ago.

A total sales volume of \$161,759,969 for this year's 28-week period surpassed last year's \$142,938,519 by \$19,720,550.

Sales during the 4-week period ending January 11 totaled \$70,472,416 as compared with \$67,613,965 during the corresponding period of 1963, an increase of \$2,858,451 or 4.23 percent.

Winn-Dixie earnings after taxes during the 28-week period ended January 11 totaled \$9,825,668, which represented a percentage to sales of 2.13 and earnings per common share of 78 cents. This compared to earnings after taxes of \$8,827,233 during the 28-week period ended January 12, 1963, which represented a percentage to sales of 2.00 and earnings per common share of 70 cents.

Shares outstanding on January 11 amounted to 12,642,754 compared to 12,671,442 on January 12, 1963.

Winn-Dixie now operates a total of 622 retail stores and eight wholesale units compared to 601 retail stores and eight wholesale units a year ago.

## Metals Expert Addresses Club

Basic chemistry textbooks are being outmoded by new research in metals chemistry. W. F. Drinkard, Jr. told twenty members of the LCA Research Club at the Gastonia Elks Club Thursday night.

Speaking on "Inorganic Chemistry: The Chemistry of the Future," Drinkard described rapid advances in use of common metals and allied elements in the production of new commercial products.

Drinkard is President and Research Manager of Mineral Research and Development Corporation of Concord and Charlotte. The LCA Research Club is a local branch of the Scientific Research Society of America.

Compounds of copper, zinc, cobalt, magnesium, iron, lithium, nickel and others are essential to the manufacture of a wide range of products. Examples cited were nickel catalysis in preparation of peanut butter, iron and lead compounds as additives to gasoline and copper salts that combine properties of agricultural fungicides and fertilizers.

Breadth of the field was illustrated by manufacture of synthetic diamonds, rubies and sapphires. These processes change a few cents worth of raw materials into products valued in hundreds of dollars a pound.

Need for metal salts in production of synthetic resins, waxes and rubber, and in making of plastics, detergents, anti-foaming agents, and glasses was shown.

Inorganic filters are definitely in the future, Drinkard said. Organic fibers buried in the ground decompose in a few weeks but inorganic fibers such as asbestos have been around thousands of years. Such fibers will be a boon to the housewife but a headache to the garbage disposal man, he said.

Joe Nelli, Program Chairman, announced that the LCA Research Club had engaged Dr. S. S. Goldich, of the U. S. Bureau of Standards to speak at a joint meeting with the Piedmont Chapter of the American Chemical Society at the Holiday Inn on Wilkinson Blvd. February 12. His subject is "The Age of the Earth."

Guests of the Research Club included Ken Higby, U. S. Bureau of Mines, Washington, D. C.; Morton Wong, U. S. Bureau of Mines, Boulder City, Nevada and John Bradburn, Georgia Nuclear Lab. Division, Lockheed Aircraft, Dawsonville, Georgia.

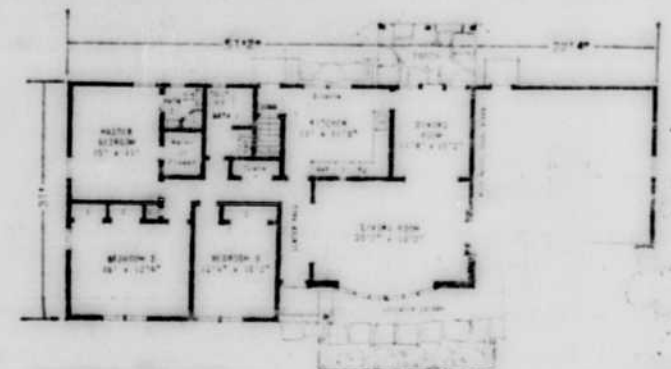
## Brownie Scout News
