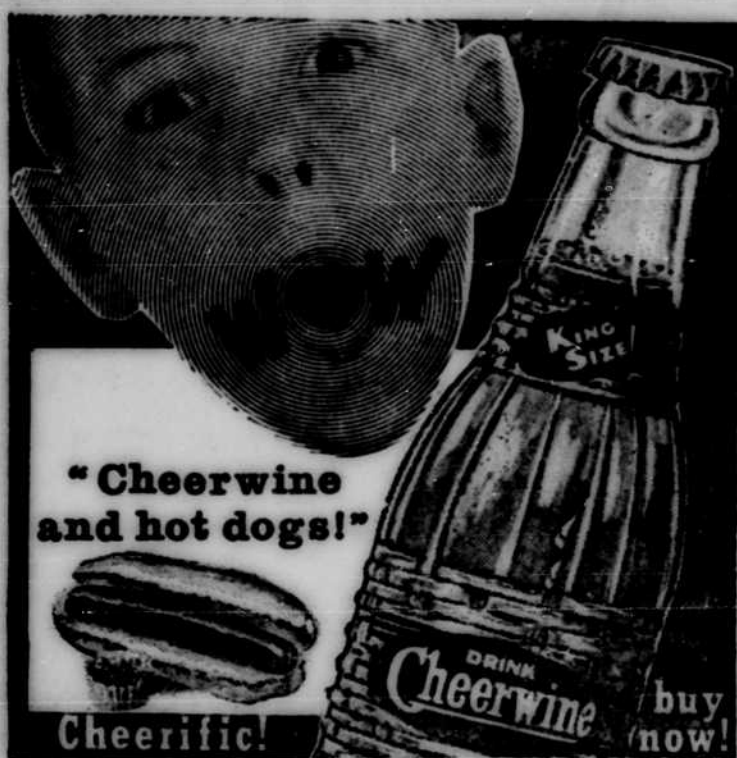

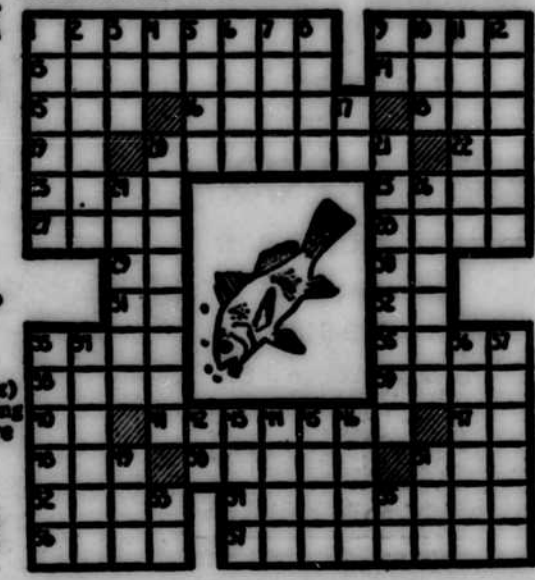

Here Are Facts On Exemptions

Five requirements must be met to claim an exemption for dependents other than the taxpayer's children on the 1963 Federal income tax return, the Internal Revenue Service explained today.

The dependent must (1) have received less than \$600 gross income; (2) have received more than half of his support from the taxpayer; (3) not have filed a

joint return with wife or husband; (4) be a citizen or resident of the United States, or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama, or the Canal Zone, and (5) either have been a member of the taxpayer's household for the entire taxable year, or be closely related to the taxpayer.

Document No. 5013 which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

Fewer Boll Weevils in '64 Cotton Crop

Tar Heel cotton growers can start the new year with one bit of comforting news.

Fewer boll weevils went into hibernation this winter than last year, according to a survey conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Average counts in the Piedmont region of the Carolinas were 968 weevils per acre, down drastically from the 1962 count of 8,631. In north-central North Carolina, the 1963 average was 1,263 compared with 5,136 in 1962.

Coastal Plain farmers, USDA says, are not quite as lucky. Weevil numbers there averaged 10,000 as compared with 12,267 a year earlier.

Boll weevil damage in 1963 was relatively light. Entomologists say that low weevil numbers and timely control efforts helped keep crop losses down.

Entomologists from USDA's Agricultural Research Service check in the number hibernating each year by taking samples of woods trash adjacent to cotton fields.

The number surviving the winter, combined with weather conditions during the early part of the cotton fruiting period, will determine potential boll weevil damage to the 1964 crop.

Bolin Serving Aboard Destroyer

The per capita consumption of tobacco by Americans 15 years old and over in 1963 was estimated at 11 pounds—practically unchanged from 1962.

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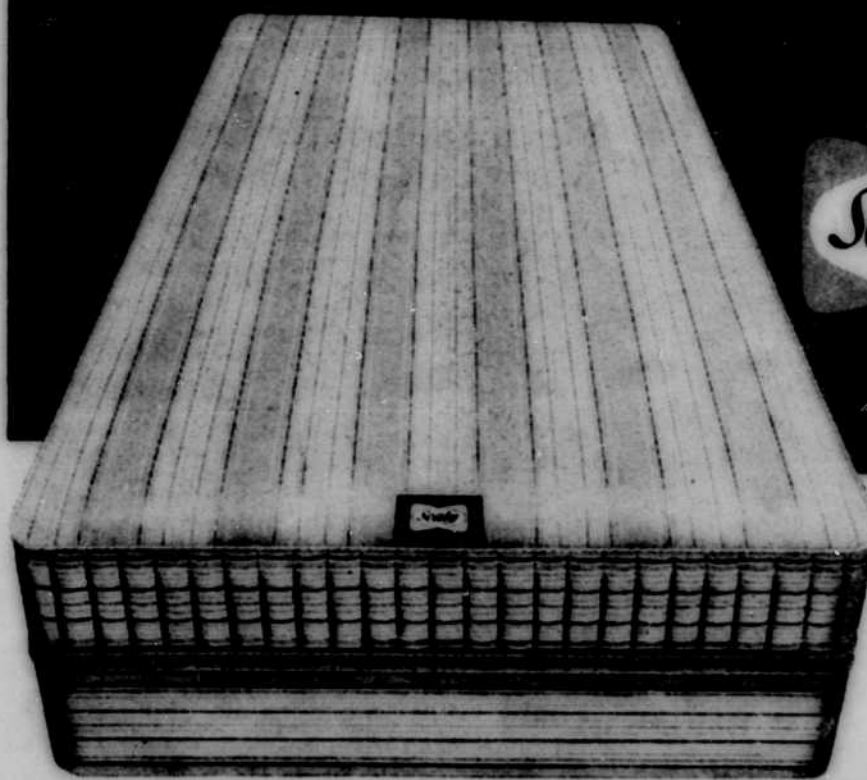

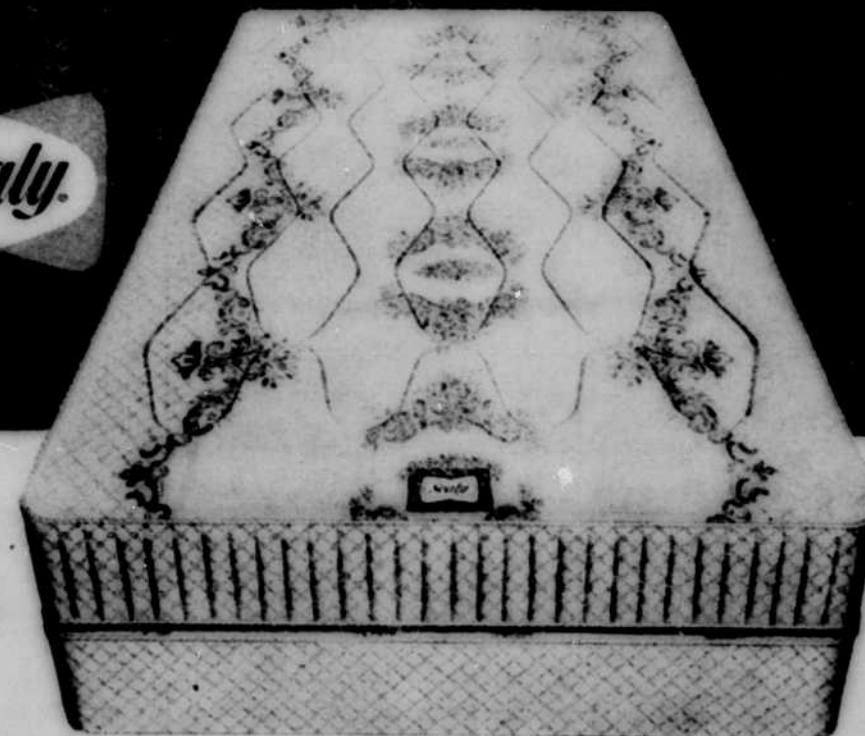
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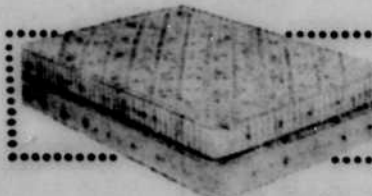
