From Southport Mrs. James Harper, Jr., President of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, Inc., has urged all of the Federated Women's Clubs and Junior Clubs in the area to participate in the massive immunization program to be known as "Operation Sunday Punch."

She said, "We appreciate the outstanding plans made by the medical societies of 11 counties to virtually eliminate polio and we are urging our clubwomen to participate. We hope that they will go to the clinics, take their families and friends, and offer their services as volunteers wherever they can serve."

The mass immunization, designed to reach at least 70 per cent of the men, women and children in the entire area, covers 11 counties with an approximate population of 830,000. Alamance, Alleghany, Ashe, Davidson, Forsyth, Guilford, Randolph, Stokes, Surry and Yadkin counties will have the clinics on Sunday, March 1st and Sunday, April 26th. Wake County has scheduled clinics for later dates.
