

Free Wheeling

With the coming of spring comes also the thoughtless despoiler of the roadside scene—the litterbug. He lurches with the warming air, according to state highway troopers who look unkindly upon his efforts to make an unholy mess of the countryside.

What is a year-round problem becomes increasingly acute as the landscape greets, they point out.

And it's not just a few discarded beer cans along the right of way that disgrace lovers of beauty.

Not by a half.

In a recent report, for example, patrolmen said: "Subjects threw beer cans, bottles, paper cups, paper, trash, garbage, lumber, rocks, cotton, corn, cartons, cans, plates, jars, bags, glass, etc."

Highway maintenance crews wearily collect the refuse and talk in terms of tons and truck loads and expenses in the thousands of dollars.

Garden club ladies get mad and launch "keep our roads beautiful" projects.

School kids volunteer occasionally to help highway workers clean up a particularly bad stretch.

Admonishments against littering come from hither and yon.

And hither and yon go the litterbugs working their mischief at 60 miles an hour.

But violators don't get off scot-free. Last year 514 trash strowers were arrested by patrolmen. Nearly all (90 per cent) paid aggregate fines and court costs of \$590 which, henceforth, ought to keep a lot of paper napkins, drink bottles and beer cans where they belong—in a litterbag!

State law against trash tossing can extract a fine of up to \$50 for the offense which officials believe is more thoughtless than deliberate.

Whatever the case troopers are standing alert as the spring driving season begins.

POINTS N' PLUGS—the state's 1913 manual of auto laws

Are you allergic to something? If so, you have a lot of company. About half of us are allergic to something.

Pollen in the air can start hay fever, certain foods may start hives. Possible allergens are countless—house dust, animal fur, feathers, cosmetics, bleaches, medicines, foods, pollen. Some people even are allergic to heat, cold or sunlight. And wasn't there a case some years ago of a wife who was allergic to her husband?

Most common result of allergy are four illnesses—hay fever, asthma, skin ailments and digestive disturbances. Hay fever is an inflammation of the eyes and nasal passages. Asthma is a disease of the bronchial tubes of the lungs. Food allergies, a sensitivity to one or more foods, can affect the skin, the digestive tract or the respiratory system. Skin allergies cause itching, sometimes rash.

Reaction to an allergy varies with individuals. One person may be only upset by eating an egg. Another could become violently ill from the small trace of egg in salad dressing.

There still are many unknown factors about the reason why someone suddenly becomes allergic to something. Allergic diseases are not usually fatal, but they cause untold discomfort and suffering. Although worry and stress might be a contributing factor, allergy is not an imaginary illness. It is very real to the sufferer.

Sometimes the allergen is known and can be avoided. Sometimes many tests by a physician are required to arrive at the true cause. Medical care is necessary in all cases for relief of discomfort and for protection against future attacks.
