### Men Of Church Set Conference

More than 1,000 Presbyterian men from the Synod of North Carolina are expected to attend the 1964 Synod Men's Conference at Montreat, June 12, 13 and 14. It was announced this week by Terrell H. Wilkinson, of Lincoln, president of the Men of Kings Mountain Presbytery.

An estimated 125 men from Kings Mountain Presbytery are expected to be in attendance at the conference this year, President Wilkinson said.

The Rev. J. Sherrard Rice, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia, S. C., is scheduled to make the principal addresses at the three-day affair. Other speakers to be featured include Dr. Marshall Dendy of Richmond, Va., director of the Board of Annuities and Relief. Both boards are agencies of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Montreat, site of the conference, is undergoing a program of renovation and improvement which will be completed before the start of the conference, thereby assuring Presbyterian men of more and better facilities than ever before.

David W. Smith of Mount Holly, Synod Men's President, said that he expects the 1964 conference to be the best attended, with the best program, in the long, successful history of the event.

### Light Docket Aired Tuesday In City Court

Four capias were issued, and two cases continued in Kings Mountain City Recorder's Court Tuesday.

Capiases were issued for James A. Martin, 17, of 802 Second Street, charged with larceny, and Jerry D. Brown, 18, of 133 McGinnis Street, charged with operating a motor vehicle without displaying a license plate.

Two capias were issued for defendants charged with public drunkenness, and cases involving Boyce Henson, 44, of 312 N. Piedmont Avenue, and Eddie Henson, 16, of 312 N. Piedmont Avenue, were contained until April 6.

Other actions included: W. P. Bumgardner, 41, of Route 1, pled guilty to charges of non-support, and was sentenced to twelve months suspended upon the payment of \$10 per week toward the support of his eleven year old minor child.

Bumgardner was behind in the weekly payments to which he and his wife agreed, and was ordered to catch up the back payments of \$42 by April 20.

Otis Wilson, Negro, 29, of Dixon Street, who was found guilty of larceny of goods in the amount of less than \$200 in a case which was tried on February 10, was given, at that time, 30 days to pay a fine of \$50 and the costs of court. Wilson failed to meet the terms of the sentence and was ordered by Judge Jack White to pay the outstanding fine and costs, or the sentence would be put into effect. Wilson could not pay to specified amount and the 12 months sentence was put into effect.

Thomas N. Tate, 22, of Route 1, Dallas, entered a notice of appeal after being found guilty of reckless driving. He was sentenced to 90 days suspended upon the payment of a \$10 fine and the costs of court.

Tate was unable to pay the fine and the costs of court, and entered a notice of appeal following Judge White's sentence which was to be put into effect.

John Calvin Gladden, 35, of Box 241 1003 First Street, was found guilty of violating the prohibition laws, and was sentenced to 30 days suspended upon the payment of the costs of court.

Charles David Phillips, 39, of 37 Cordova Street, Asheville, pled guilty to three counts of issuing worthless checks and was sentenced to 30 days suspended upon the payment of the three outstanding checks and the costs of court. The three checks were written against the First National Bank of Kings Mountain and amounted to a total of \$68.70.

"Six years without a loss-time accident is almost unheard of", said Reeves. "And the people of Kings Mountain should be extremely proud of this achievement", he added.

A national safety award given annually to the mining company which has the greatest number of man hours worked without a loss-time accident, and the larger mining company's have a tremendous advantage of the smaller plants because of the large number of workers.

Mining Congress representative Burns told the employees that although a smaller operation doesn't have the opportunity to accumulate a large number of man hours worked during a given year, Foote's six-year safety record is probably the longest period of time that any mining operation in the nation has gone without a loss-time accident.

Upon receipt of the Safety Award, President Neil Johnson expressed his appreciation to the employees and praised their efforts for making the Foote Mineral Company one of the safest operations of its kind in the United States.

"This award is one which all of us here are proud of," Johnson said, "And it is our primary objective here at Foote to make still further strides in safety achievement", he concluded.
