#### **Defers Decision On House Race** By MARTIN HARMON

Don Glass said Wednesday he will offer for the board of county commissioners as a Democrat and will file with the elections board Monday.

Mr. Glass, a registered Demcerat, sought to file as a Republican, but the attorney-general ruled that he could not seek nomination other than by the party in which he is registered. He would not be able to change party affiliation until April 25, eight days after the filing dead-

Mr. Glass, a Kings Mountain grocer, will pose a three-man race for the District 2 district nomination. J. Breadus Ellis, incumbent and board chairman, seeks re-election and already is opposed by Coleman Goforth, Stoney Point dairyman.

"I continue to receive much encouragement to seek a county commission seat, regardless of party, and I shall file as a Democrat candidate Monday," Mr. Glass said.

# **Kakassey Says**

Construction on the new K Mills, Inc., weaving mill will begin on Floyd street within two weeks, A. J. Kakassey, of Glenview, Ill., said Wednesday.

Mr. Kakassey told the Herald Wednesday afternoon, "We have completed all details. Everything is signed and sealed."

Vigil McIntyre, Shelby contractor, has contracted for construction of the 36,500 square foot building, which will house a weaving and finishing operation specializing in the production of ooth flat and pile upholstery abrics.

It is anticipated the construction will be completed about September 1 and that operations will begin within a few weeks thereafter. Operations will begin with rom 40 to 60 employees.

"Within two years we should employ 200 persons," Mr. Kakassey added.

He described the new firm as a 'private" corperation, of which e is president and his wife, Mrs. Catherine Marie Kakassey, is ecretary-treasurer.

A native of Summitt, N. J., where his father owned a textile plant, Mr. Kakassey remarked, "I was practically born under a loom." Age 48, he has been in fabric sales since 1935 when he joined Iselin-Jefferson, in New York. He established his own sales agency about six years ago and has lived in Glenview since 1946. He expects to establish re-sidence here in a year to 18 months. He and his wife have eight children age 18 months to
