# **Philosophies On Space Age Living By Family Life Seminar Panelists**

A progress report for Space age parents and educators: About half of today's youth are still getting their sex education from their friends. It was this way in 1938 and its practically unchanged today.

The father and mother are the family's board of directors and their task is to direct the enterprise so it will grow so when they retire their children will be able to take over direction of their own businesses.

We can think of mental health as a family business.

Rearing of the youngster is left almost to the mother. Men have a natural hesitancy about being involved in what is termed family life education.
