Don't Clutter Streets, Roads

RALEIGH — Motor Vehicles Commissioner Edward Scheidt, who recently reminded Tar Heel motorists that litterbugging is under sharp surveillance by the highway patrol, called the practice today "thoughtless acts on the part of thousands of otherwise responsible motorists."

He said the litter problem is largely the result of the daily carelessness of highway users and can be eliminated when the bad habit of littering is replaced with the good habit of pride in clean, safe and attractive surroundings.

"Last year the highway patrol found it necessary to arrest some 500 motorists thoughtlessly or deliberately littering the highways," Scheidt said. "This represents a needless outlay of money and manpower which is needed far more in traffic protection activities."

"The vehicles executive said the patrol's enforcement efforts against litterbugging would remain vigorous.

"But far more effective," he went on, "would be a new sense of responsibility among those who use the roads. Few people really try to keep North Carolina beautiful when the collection of tons of refuse is a day to day operation along our primary highway system."

"Most people don't realize the staggering amount of litter discarded in their wake—and the costly efforts required to remove it."

"They have no feeling of guilt when tossing trash along the right of way," he said.

In addition to unsightliness, Scheidt said throughout the country more than 50 million dollars is spent annually cleaning up the highways of America. And that authorities estimate that perhaps 1000 persons are killed in mishaps caused by cars striking or swerving to avoid objects thrown on the highways.

"Scaled down these are the same problems we have in North Carolina," he said.

Scheidt asked motorists to carry and use a litterbag in their car, especially with the opening of spring and vacation travel.

He also urged community officials to provide sufficient trash cans, conveniently placed, as an aid in combatting highway litter.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Q—Although I filed a social security claim in 1963, I continued working the entire year and earned \$2000. Since I retired the first of this year, I now want to begin receiving my benefits. Will it be possible for me to have my benefits increased because of my high earnings last year?

A—Yes. You should see your social security office. If you worked as an employee, bring your W-2 form for 1963; if you were self-employed, bring in a copy of your income tax return as well as proof that you paid your self-employment tax.

Q—I am receiving benefits for three of my children under age 18. Last year the oldest one worked full time during the summer and parttime during the rest of the year. I believe he earned about \$1275. Is it necessary for me to file a formal report of these earnings?

A—Yes it is. The law requires you to file an annual report of his earnings before April 16 of this year.

Q—My father worked for me all last year on my farm. Do I have to pay the social security tax on the wages I paid him?

A—1961 was the first year that work done by a parent for a son or daughter in a trade or business was covered by social security. Therefore, you are required to report the wages your father last year and pay the required social security tax.


