Haggai Speaks At Lions Fete

"Troubled people have the unforgiving spirit," Rev. Tom Haggai, High Point minister-at-large, said Tuesday night, in a humor-filled inspirational address at the 26th annual ladies night banquet of the Kings Mountain Lions club.

Mr. Haggai suggested that people fall into many traps, chasing the goddesses of success, popularity or materialism.

Though he flayed this nation's penchant for foreign aid programs which he described as "forcing ourselves on others", he also noted that the world has shrunk greatly within the past twenty years.

"We're only 17 minutes from a missile launched in Moscow," he reminded.

Success in international relations, he contended, could be obtained by trying to provide others of the world "our real sweets", which he listed as 1) everybody is somebody, 2) freedom of worship and speech, and 3) the principle that man is entitled to the fruits of his own labor.
