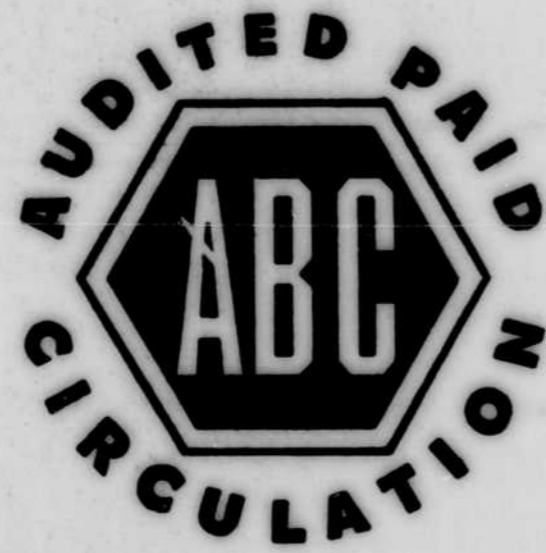

Bowman's Knob with four girls to a tent. Each unit has an adequate troop house around which activities are centered and which offers shelter for rainy day fun and work.

All girls dine in a central dining hall where well balanced meals are served by a capable kitchen staff. The lodge is the center of the camp and affords a well equipped kitchen. Girl Scouts receive valuable training by being assigned kapers during the camp session. The most popular kaper is that of the "hopper". This Girl Scout brings the plates bountifully heaped with food to the table and replenishes them during the meal. The camp kitchen is carefully inspected by the Gaston County Health Department and receives regularly a top grade 'A' rating.

Camp Rotary provides a variety of activities at a minimum of cost. Swimming along with expert instruction in both are among the favorite activities. Nature hikes, crafts, sketching, painting, nature study, hiking and cookouts are always highlights of the camping season. In the evenings, campers gather around the big camp fire to sing, talk, entertain each other with skits or to relax after a busy day.

Girls in Senior Scouting are well on their way to becoming out-of-door specialists. In the summer of 1964, these high school girls will be sharpening their skills to apply for selection for the Senior Roundup in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. To this giant national Scouts from all over the United States and many other countries as well. To be eligible to apply, a camping experience in the summer of 1964 is required.
