Daniel Boone Wagon Train Rolling Again

Modern day adventurers pit their strength against the hardships of the old Daniel Boone Trail, June 30—July 4, when they attempt to cross the Blue Ridge Mountains in a mile-long wagon train. For the second summer, residents of Wat-uga, Wilkes, and surrounding counties, who like to re-enact their ancestors' history, retrace the rugged route that Daniel Boone first followed in opening the way to the West.

Their 75-wagon expedition, under direction of Wagon Master, DeWitt Barnett of Boone and Chief Scout, Ivey Moore, of Wilkes County, rolls out of the foothills town of North Wilkesboro on June 30.

Northwestern North Carolina men, women and children making the haul will dress in pioneer garb typical of the day in which Daniel Boone lived. They'll pack such equipment as old-time cooking utensils, broad axes and Kentucky rifles.

The wagon train trip will be on the 35-mile trail four days. Overnight camps are scheduled for Ferguson, Darby, Triplett and the "Horn in the West" outdoor theatre grounds at Boone.

The pioneer-styled caravan plans to arrive in Boone, named after the famous pioneer, on July 3 and parade through the town's business district July 4. The big celebration will call attention to the 13th season staying of "Horn in the West" at Boone.

Special awards will be presented for the best wagons, the best costumes, best horses and riders and best window displays.

History of the Daniel Boone Trail dates back to 1773. At that time the famous hunter in Wilkes County on the Yadkin River at the mouth of Beaver Creek near the present village of Ferguson.

Light Docket Aired Monday In City Court

A light docket of cases was aired in City Recorder's Court before Judge Jack White Monday.

Donald H. Wood, 21, of 308 Fairview Street, pled guilty to charges of hit-and-run and was sentenced to 4 months, suspended upon the payment of a \$25 fine and the costs of court. Wood was also sentenced to pay for damages to the car which he hit. Damages were estimated at \$25. The accident occurred on Mountain Street between the Joy Theatre and Victory Chevrolet.

Ora Grayson Brown, 37, of Alendale, S. C., pled guilty to abandonment and non support and entered into an agreement to pay \$20 weekly for the support of his two minor children. Final action on the case was continued until June 29, pending additional legal agreements between Brown and his wife.

Jimmy H. Ledbetter, 19, of General Delivery, Blacksburg, S. C., was sentenced to thirty days under the supervision of the N. C. State Prison Department, after pleading guilty to driving without a valid North Carolina driver's license. The sentence was handed down in view of Ledbetter's previous criminal record in Kings Mountain Recorder's Court.

Charles Smith, 22, of Route 1, pled guilty to charges of public drunkenness, violating the prohibition laws, and damage to city property, and was sentenced to 30 days, suspended upon the payment of a \$15 fine and the costs of court and \$25 for damages to toilet articles in the City jail. He was also placed on good behavior for a period of 90 days.

Three Bessemer City youths; Yates P. Moses, 21, of 208 Georgia Avenue; Jack S. Wood, 18, of 414 E. Virginia Avenue; and James H. Latham, 18, of 109 E. Georgia Avenue, were given 30 day suspended sentences after pleading guilty to violating the prohibition laws. The three were reportedly drinking at the Deal Street swimming pool last weekend. Each was assessed a \$5 fine and the costs of court, and suspended from any of the Kings Mountain recreational facilities for a one year period.

Leonard E. Smith, 22, of Route 1, pled guilty to charges of violating the prohibition laws and was sentenced to 30 days, suspended upon the payment of half the costs of court.

The case involving Mack LaFavers, 39, of 515 Broad Street, charged with assault on a female and non-support, was continued until June 29.

Other cases which were continued until June 29 were: Jeremy John Ryan Bell, 25, 243 Country Club, Shelby stop light violation; and Bill G. Jackson, 27, Route 1, issuing worthless checks.

Three cases of public drunken-

ness were tried with defendants being sentenced to 30 days, suspended upon the payment of the costs of court.
