Democrats Nominate Moore, Scott, Goforth And Hewitt

Goforth Edges Commissioner . Broad Ellis

North Carolina Democrats, in record numbers, made Dan K. Moore a landslide nominee for governor Saturday in the run-off primary. Thy also nominated Robert W. (Bob) Scott for lieutenant-governor in a comparatively close "ace.

In two ru. off races for the county com.n.ssion, Democrats unseated J. Broad Ellis, incumbent commission chairman, by a narrow matgir, and nominated Spurgeon Hewitt to succeed John D. White, retiring as commission-er. Newcomer Coleman Goforth, Stoney Poin: dairyman, edged Ellis by a margin of 417 votes. Goforth won 6654 to 6.207. Hewitt defeated Charles A. Bridges, Sr., handily polling 7.474 to Bridges' 5.516 The Hewitt margin was 1,953.

Unofficial returns gave Moore a majority of more than 184,000 over Richards a Preyer, who had led by 23,500 in the May 30 voting. Moore had over 480,000, while Preyer totaled slightly more

The Scott margin of 53,590 over Clifton Blue n the May 30 primary was pried to slightly over 15,000 on basis of unofficial returns, and, as returns arrived at election tabulation centers, it appeared for a me Blue might be

Cleveland County voters gav majorities to the two successful candidates.

Moore won \$416 to Preyer's 5,116, a marg of 3,300, while Scott led Bire 7,729, to 4,989, a margin of 2.840, Both had beer Cleveland's favorites on May 30. when Dr. I. Beverly Lake and several other candidates had been eliminated from the governor's race, and when John Jordan had been eliminated from the race for m. from Grover's First Baptist b lieutenant-governor.

For governor the township, which includes East Kings Mountain, Bethwere, West Kings Mountain, and Grover precincts, was slightly ahead of the state average in supporting Dan K. Moore, giving him a margin of 1433 to 823, cr approximately 7 to 4, over Planardson Preyer.

For lieutenant-governor, Demorats favored Bob Scott 1244 to 823 over Chiton Blue, somewhat better than 3 to 2 and also better than Scott's state-wide margin.

The townsnip favored J. Broad Ellis over winner Coleman Goforth, 1207 to 990, for the District II corraission nomination, and supported Charles A. Bridges Sr., 1125 to 898, over Spurgeon Hewitt for the District IV nomi-

A total of 2264 Democrats visited the polls for the run-off pri-maries, with 570 logged in at West Kings Mountain, 699 at East Kings Mountain, 314 at Bethware, and 281 at Grover.

Utilities Body Authorizes New Service

Extended area service between Kings Mountain and Gastonia has been approved by the North Carolina Utilities Commission. The announcement was made today by F. Bryan Houck, Southern Bell's Group Manager.

Houck stated that "telephone engineers are now in the process of making detailed plans to provide the necessary equipment to tie the two towns together on a 'toll-free' basis. It will take several months to manufacture and install the necessary equipment after it has been engineered. We hope to have the service available to our customers in these two communities by the latter part of 1965," he said.

The inauguration of the new and improved service will mean that subscribers in each community will be able to dial a far large number of people without paying long distance charges. With the introduction of this new service, monthly rates of the Kings Mounain subscribers will be adjusted to the level charged throughout the state for exchanges having a similar number of telephones included in their local calling area.

Kings Mountain subscribers, with 70 percent participating, favored the toll-face service to Gastonia by 54 percent. In return, Southern Beil spelled out the rental increase as a maximum of 60 cents per month for residential phones and \$1.50 per month for business phones.

The proposal for the toll-free service to Castonia, expected to add more than 17,000 phones to Kings Mountain's "free" listings, was advanced by Kings Mountain Chamber of Commerce and had the endorsement of all Kings Mountain ci /ie clubs.
