Perk Up Menus With Fresh Peaches

Eat fresh, tree-ripened peaches for breakfast, lunch, dinner or for between meal snacks as long as they are in season. A luscious ripe peach makes a tasty low calorie snack. One 3-to 4-ounce peach has only 50 calories. Miss S. Virginia Wilson, nutritionist for the Agricultural Extension Service at N. C. State says the peach also contains some calcium, iron, and the B vitamins—thiamine, riboflavin and niacin. It will furnish about 10 per cent of your day's quota of vitamin A.

If you are interested in the varieties of peaches that are recommended for canning or freezing plus some delicious recipes, contact your local home economics agent for a free copy of Folder No. 199 on "Peaches" or write the Department of Agricultural Information, Box 5037, N. C. State, Raleigh.

The following are two recipes taken from the folder on peaches: For peach dumplings, make a rich biscuit dough by increasing the fat 1 or 2 tablespoons per cup of flour. Roll 1/4 inch thick. Cut into squares large enough to cover each peach. Place a peeled whole peach in the center of each square of dough. Sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon and lemon juice. Roll with butter. Bring opposite ends of dough together on top of peaches. Moistened edges to seal. Prick on top in several places. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) until peaches are tender and pastry is brown—about 30 to 40 minutes. Serve with ice cream, hard sauce or a syrup made with brown sugar, water and cinnamon.

GERMAN PEACH PUDDING 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg 1 cup flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 cup milk 4 cups chopped peaches 1 cup sugar Cream together butter and 1/2 cup sugar. Beat in the egg thoroughly. Sift together the flour and baking powder, then add it alternately with the milk to the egg and butter mixture. Beat until smooth. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole or 8-inch baking pan. Pour over the butter 4 cups of chopped peaches that have been sweetened with 1 cup sugar. Bake in a moderate oven at 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until done. Serve with or without heavy cream or hard sauce.

Peach-Glazed Chicken Is Season's Favorite

If balmy weather has tempted you out-of-doors for a patio party, consider this hostess-easy oven meal of baked chicken, carrots and biscuits.

It's a one pan operation that makes both the preparation and cleanup simple and fast. The chicken bakes till almost done, then is topped with canned peach pie filling that forms a flavorful glaze. The baking powder biscuits we suggest are from a can, too—the kind you'll find in the refrigerated dairy case section of your grocery store. These can be baked in the same pan you've used for the chicken, added when you spoon on the pie filling glaze. To complete the meal, drain and add a can of carrots to heat through as the biscuits bake. A salad and beverage, prepared before guests arrive, add the finishing touch to this easy-to-prepare meal.

PEACH GLAZED CHICKEN AND BISCUITS

1/2 cup butter or margarine 1/2 cup flour 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 1/2 to 3 pound broiler-fryer, cut up 1 can (2 1/2 cups) peach pie filling 1 can (1 lb.) whole carrots, drained 1 can refrigerated powder biscuits

Melt butter or margarine in 13 x9 inch baking pan. Combine flour and seasonings in paper bag; add several pieces of chicken at a time and shake. Place chicken pieces skin-side up in pan; bake uncovered at 400 degrees for 40 minutes. Move chicken to end of pan. Spoon peach pie filling over chicken. Arrange carrots in center of pan. Place biscuits in other end of pan; return to oven and bake at 400 degrees F, 15 to 20 minutes longer. Yields: four servings.
