NEW RECIPE BOOK PLANNED

Homemakers enjoy the exchange of recipes which their families particularly like. So Mrs. Warner Madre, the Perquimans County Home Demonstration foods and nutrition leader, is planning a salad and dessert recipe book featuring favorite dishes of club members in the county.

Mrs. Ila Grey White, home economics agent, says the food and nutrition leaders in the clubs will collect the recipes.

It's a hot time to be talking about heating systems but that is what club members in Nash County have been doing. Mrs. Agnes Safy, home economics agent, says many families depend on farm income, and planting harvest time is a good time to

think about the use of money. A housing survey conducted last fall indicated the need for information on heating systems. The members are deciding on ways they can use their income to improve or replace present heating devices. Mrs. Safy says this is a good time to buy heating equipment since you can usually get a better buy in the summer.

EXTENSION BULLETINS USED

Cumberland County extension agents have found a new way of reaching homemakers with up-to-date information. Mrs. Era Robinson, home economics agent, says they have been sending Extension publications to persons announcing births in the local newspaper.

Mrs. Robinson says many of the young mothers are being reached with Extension information for the first time and several have requested additional bulletins.
