A&P To Build \$4.5 Million Baking Plant
CHARLOTTE—The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company has announced plans to build a \$4,500,000 bakery here.
A & P said its National Bakery Division has acquired a six-acre site for the plant at Hovis and Tar Heel Roads and construction is expected to begin early this fall. The 148,000-sq.-ft. facility will consolidate the Division's present bakery operations now located in three buildings at 817-822 and 900 Hill street in Charlotte.
"The new bakery will provide the expanded production that has been indicated by the growing customer demand for Jane Parker baked products," said James H. Nichols, vice president of the Charlotte Unit. "This new operation will enable us to produce a million pounds of assorted bakery products weekly for our 234 stores in the North and South Carolina areas."
The two-and-three-level structure of reinforced concrete and brick was designed by A & P's engineering department and J. N. Pease Associates of Charlotte.
In order to prevent air-borne contamination from entering the production areas of the plant, all the air will be filtered and heated. The interior walls of buff-colored ceramic tile and the red vitreous shale brick floors represent the ultimate in sanitation and cleaning ease, company officials said.
A special illuminating system to simulate daylight will be installed in the bakery. All fluorescent fixtures will be mounted flush with the ceiling to eliminate dust-catching surfaces.
The building also will be equipped with an indoor three-car rail siding for the unloading of bulk flour. Special electrical connections will be located along the sidings so refrigeration systems in rail cars can be operated while the cars are waiting to be unloaded.
As an additional precaution against the possibility of air-borne matter entering the bakery, all exterior doors including the huge railroad car entrance door will be equipped with air curtains which prevent matter from entering while the doors are open.
The plant will be able to accommodate eight trailer trucks simultaneously at the bakery's receiving and shipping dock, which will be equipped with special load levelers to bring the tail gate of trailers flush with the platform regardless of variations in height.
The bakery will be equipped with a blast freezer for quick-freezing baked goods.
"This blast freezer will be capable of maintaining a temperature of 40 degrees below zero," Nichols explained.
The plant also will have a 10-below-zero holding room with a capacity of over 500,000 cubic feet.
A public address system will broadcast recorded music throughout the plant and lunch rooms will be completely air-conditioned. The lunch rooms also will be equipped with snack and beverage dispensers.
