When Lincolnton Coach Von Ray Harris said not to count his team out in the Southwest Conference race, he was right. Lincolnton's Wolves are going to be a team to watch in this year's football campaign.

Dashing Halfbacks

Last Friday night Lincolnton started its '64 campaign by winning a 32-7 decision over the Ironmen of Cherryville. Haifbacks Steve Brackett and Paul Nantz received much of the credit for this win. Brackett scored three of Lincolnton's touchdowns with a 74-yard and two 60-yard runs. His 74-yard run came in the first quarter when Cherryville had to punt out of its own territory. Brackett ran the first play from scrimmage into the Cherryville end zone, putting Lincolnton ahead 6-0. The conversion attempt was no good and that score stood until,


