### In His Cousin's Hit-Run Death A young Cherryville man has

been charged with murder, following the death of his cousin, Fred Theodore Daves, 30, on the Stoney Point road near here Saturday afternoon,

Investigation by Sheriff Haywood Anen indicates that Franklin D. Daves, 24, ran down his cousin with an auto, killing the man instantly. Eye witnesses - who escaped

injury by jumping into a side ditch were the victim's wife, Mrs. Kataleen Daves, and Miss rielen Rudisili, 40, of Cherryville. It was Miss Rudisill's car and Franklin Daves also is charged with their of the car. Sneriff Allen gave this ac-

The four left Cherryville together. When they stopped for gas, the younger Daves, said to have been dr.nking, got behind the wheel to drive. Proceeding recklessly, the other passengers begged him to stop He finally turned off on the dirt road into a sand pit adjacent to Muddy on the road, drove off alone, but quickly turned back. Apparently aiming the car at the three former passengers, he struck his cousin, who either did not see the approaching auto in time, or

thought the driver was bluffing. Daves was apprehended about an hour later. Sheriff Allen had gone to Dave's father's home when the wanted man drove up. Seeing officers, he ran into a nearby store. He was captured quickly.

Coroner J. Ollie Harris said the driver himself barely missed death on Muddy Fork Creek. After he slammed into a bank. the ear was inches away from turning over into the creek, on the driver's side, where the depth of the water was five feet.

Funeral for Fred Theodore Daves was held Monday afternoon at Cherryville's Second Baptist church, burial following at Mountain Rest cemetery here.
