# Businessmen

Kings Mountain's economic prospects for 1965 appear good, a spot survey of area industrial-sts showed Wetinesday

Whether 1935 will be a good business year in Kings Mountain brought virtually similar opinions from yarn manufacturers as well as businessmen.

W. K. Mauney, Sr. of Mauney Mills is optimistic as well as George Houser of Sadie Mills, Ben Grimes of Phenix Plant No. 1 of Burlington Industries and Tom Tate, secretary-treasurer of Home Savings & Loan Association, among other leaders.

Mr. Houser said, "It looks better than a year ago, in fact business has been brisk and we are hopeful it will continue and 1965 will be better than 1964."

Most leaders shared the same opinion that recent legislation giving the textile industry oneprice cotton is the difference.

Before Congress passed the one-price cotton legislation, it was possible for foreign textile industries to buy American cotton at a lower price than could business interests. The expansion in textile industries in the Carolinas is due to their ability to buy cotton at an equitable price, Mr. Houser believes. Mr. Houser noted that this legislation opened up buying that people had been holding back and he hopes the two-year program will be "a permanent thing." The






