Kings Mountain National Military Park logged in 294,706 visitors during 1964, a drop from 1963's record of 346,057 in total visitations.

In announcing the figures, Superintendent Ben F. Moomaw said the drop could be credited to two reasons: 1) closing of the South Carolina State Park; and 2) summer rains which rained-out 10 of 13 weekends during the 1964 summer season.

The Kings Mountain Park has boasted new records of attendance since the end of World War II.
