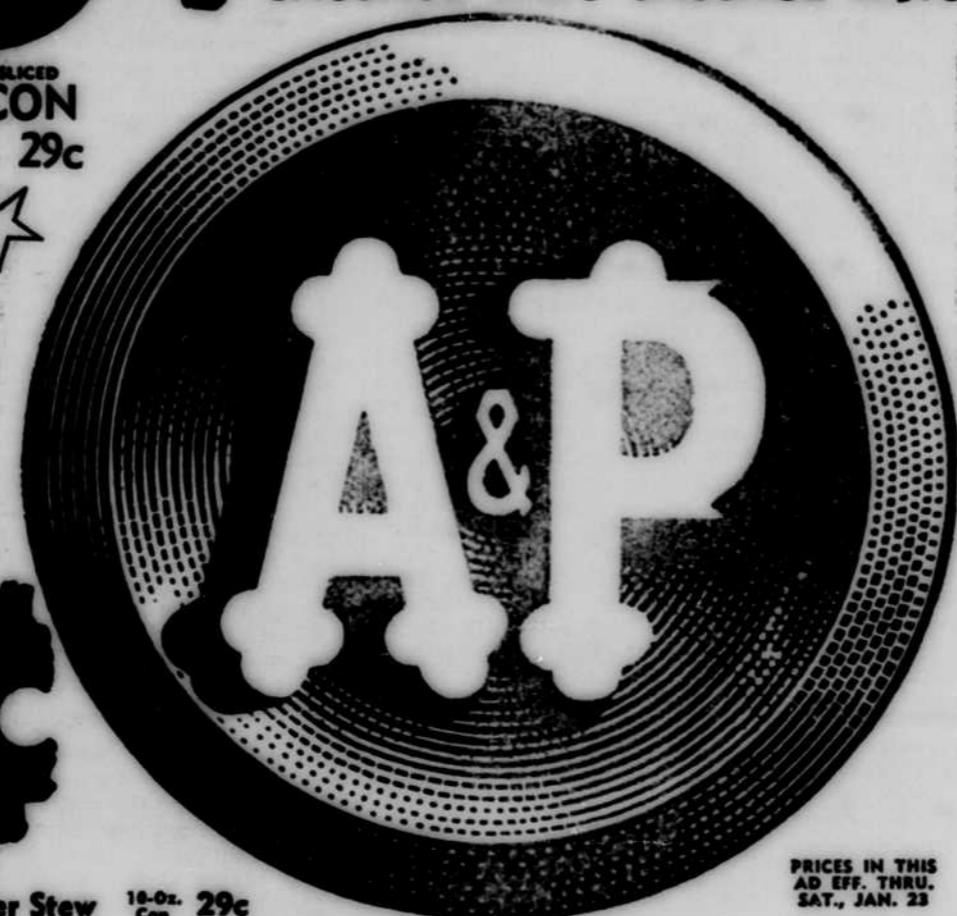

**STRETCHING YOUR DOLLARS**

For years, I have been listening to parents complain about how little their children understand the value of money. They say, "I don't want my kids to suffer the way I did. I want them to have everything they want!"

This might sound noble, but it is nonsense. We are creating a generation of "monetary monsters" who have practically no appreciation for what they are receiving. Following a thoroughly distasteful incident with his son, a friend of mine introduced a procedure for indoctrinating a sense of financial responsibility in his children that I would like to recommend to all families.

The last financial straw occurred when his son, a 17 year old high school student, demanded his own car. Now, my friend can easily indulge his children in every whim, and he does. Since the boy had been using the family car whenever he wanted it, the request for an auto of his own was, in my opinion, excessive. However, my friend had this American mania to go all out for his kids.

Instead of giving his son a sorely needed fact of life lecture as I would have advised, he decided to surprise his boy with a spanking, new convertible. To add an extra touch of personal satisfaction to the gift, my friend took his son to the dealer to pick up the car. The trip was charged with cheerfulness. After all, this is the second largest investment many people make in their lifetime; and the biggest for most. Finally, standing before the white convertible, the boy's face became twisted with disappointment.

"Gee, Dad," his son moaned, "I wanted a such-and-such sports car."

Furious, the father made arrangements with the dealer to have the car sold to someone else. Still angry when he reached home, my friend, a brilliant businessman, decided to introduce a program to make his children financially responsible adults. Here is what he did:

1. He immediately stopped giving his children gifts, except on their birthdays and special holidays.
2. He organized family meetings whenever he and his wife decided to make any kind of purchase—such as buying a new washing machine or painting the house. Although the children were encouraged to give their opinions freely, the final decision was made by my friend and his wife. This experience gave the children valuable insights into financial responsibility.
3. A rule was established: if a child was to receive any money beyond his allowance, he would have to perform various services. But first, mother and dad had to approve the purpose for which the money was to be used.
4. The children were permitted to sit in on discussions with the family's insurance agent, lawyer and accountant.

If you are giving to your children until it hurts, in the long run remember it will hurt THEM a lot more than you.
