### Social Security Facts Given

Over the years three major misconceptions have arisen concerning social security financing, according to Lex G. Barkley, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Gastonia, N. C.

The most common of these is the belief that the social security trust funds are "in the red." In the opinion of the believer, the social security program is bankrupt and there won't be enough money to pay off when many of those working today reach retirement age.

"These critics base their assertion on the fact that we do not operate on a full-reserve basis like private insurance companies do. Private insurance must be ready to pay off 100 percent on the dollar if they should cease to operate. No such total reserve is required under the

social security program, because social security is a non-voluntary program for coverage of future as well as present generations of workers.

The program is guaranteed new entrants year after year. Thus, the social security program does not need a 100 percent reserve because it is assured permanent income from those who work for a living.

A second misconception is that the social security program always pays out more than it takes in. Here again it is implied that the social security program is slowly going broke and won't be able to meet future commitments. This is simply not true. It is true that for short periods of time the expenditures exceed the receipts. But this is a temporary condition due primarily to expanding the program. The point the critics miss is that the social security law provides for an expanding tax scale at specified times to assure its solvency.

The third misconception is that the payment of full benefits to people who have worked under social security only a short time is financially dangerous. Here the critics fail to understand the basic concept of social legislation.

Barkley explained that social security was born during the depression of the 30's. A primary concern at that time was to get purchasing power into the hands of the older people who were the first thrown out of work and would be the last rehired. Over the long pull, social security was intended to compensate for loss of earning power due to old-age, death, disability. Congress adopted the same policy for social security that many employers use by adopting the theory of "prior service credits." This means that the older people were given credit for having worked years before social security became law. Most employers who adopt a private pension plan give their older workers credits for years of service at no cost to the workers.

"Our critics," Barkley concluded, "would have difficulty convincing these people that social security is a give-away program."

Four sections of Data Processing will be available to students seeking training in this field. There will be a beginning class from 1-9:55 p.m. on Tuesday and Friday, a second semester class from 7-9:55 p.m. on Monday and Thursday, a 2-5 p.m. class on Monday and Wednesday and a 1-4 p.m. class on Thursday.

Other courses to be offered on Monday and Thursday, most of them from 7-8:25 p.m. are Accounting, Bible, Biology, English 101 and 102, English 202, history, Psychology 201 and 202, Short-hand, Journalism, Sociology, Spanish and typing. On Tuesday and Thursday from 7:30-10 p.m. a class in art will be conducted and from 6-8 p.m. a class of Engineering Drawing is available.

Cost per semester for courses taken for college credit is \$20 per semester hour carried and \$10 per semester hour for courses taken for non-credit. Most courses are three hour credit courses.

Art is \$60, plus a \$20 laboratory fee; art for non-credit is \$28, plus the laboratory fee, typing is \$60 and Data Processing is \$80, plus a \$75 laboratory fee.

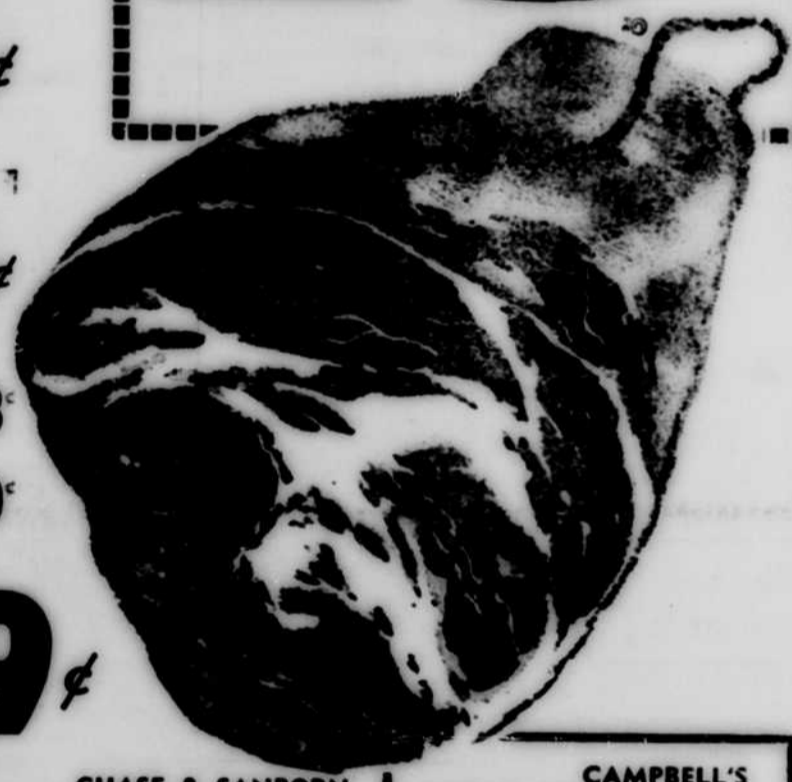
