Chocolate-Nut Bread's Easy To Prepare

Something different to serve with tea or for sandwiches in the lunch box is easy-to-make chocolate nut bread.

Prepared biscuit mix shortcuts the mixing procedure, and the tang of orange juice complements the rich flavor of this bread, which may be spread with softened butter or cream cheese for dainty sandwiches.

QUICK CHOCOLATE NUT BREAD

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 egg
 - 1 1/4 cups orange juice
 - 3 cups biscuit mix
 - 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
 - 3/4 cup chopped nuts
 - 1 teaspoon allspice
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Combine sugar and egg, blending well. Add orange juice and biscuit mix alternately, stirring well after each addition. Blend in remaining ingredients. Pour into a greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) for 50 to 60 minutes, or until done.

Dr. Johnson To Speak Here

Dr. Guion Griffin Johnson, formerly professor of history at the University of North Carolina, will conduct the annual mission study at St. Matthew's Lutheran church Sunday night at 7 o'clock.

Women of the church are sponsoring the study of the book, "New Nations and the Kingdom" and area churches are invited to hear Mrs. Johnson along with the local congregation.

Dr. Johnson was a member of the staff which made a sociological survey of St. Helena Island near Beaufort, S. C., and was a collaborator in the Carnegie-McNair study of the Negro in America. For 10 years she was research associate in the Institute for Research in Social Science in the University of North Carolina.

For several years, beginning in 1945, she was executive secretary of the Georgia Conference on Social Welfare in Atlanta where her husband, Dr. Guy B. Johnson of the UNC Sociology Department, was doing research.

Mrs. Johnson has taken an active part in the civic life of Chapel Hill in recent years. As a volunteer she was community service member of the Chapel Hill Rationing Board during the last war, information executive for the Chapel Hill Office of Civilian Defense and collector of war records for Orange County. She is author of two books in the field of cultural history, and her doctoral dissertation received the Smith Research Award at the University at Chapel Hill.

Mrs. Johnson is former chairman of the Board of the National Publicity Council, past first vice-president of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs and past first vice-president of the American Association of University Women. She is past president of the N. C. Women's Council.

In 1955 she was the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award for Women which is presented annually by the Epsilon Beta Chapter of the Chi Omega Sorority at the University of North Carolina.

The citation described Mrs. Johnson as an "author, scholar, executive and historian who has ever been a living example of integrity, high ideals and an understanding heart."

Educated at Baylor University, the University of Missouri and UNC, she lectured at Rhodes University in Grahamstown, South Africa in 1960 and held a Ford Foundation grant in tour of educational institutions in Africa. She and her husband made a world tour from 1959-60 and in 1961 Mrs. Johnson was a member of the Phelps-Stokes study tour of West Africa.

Mrs. Grady A. Rhea, Sr. is visiting her daughter, Mrs. Wilma Henson and family, in Douglas, Ga. Mrs. Rhea expects to return to her home here sometime in March.

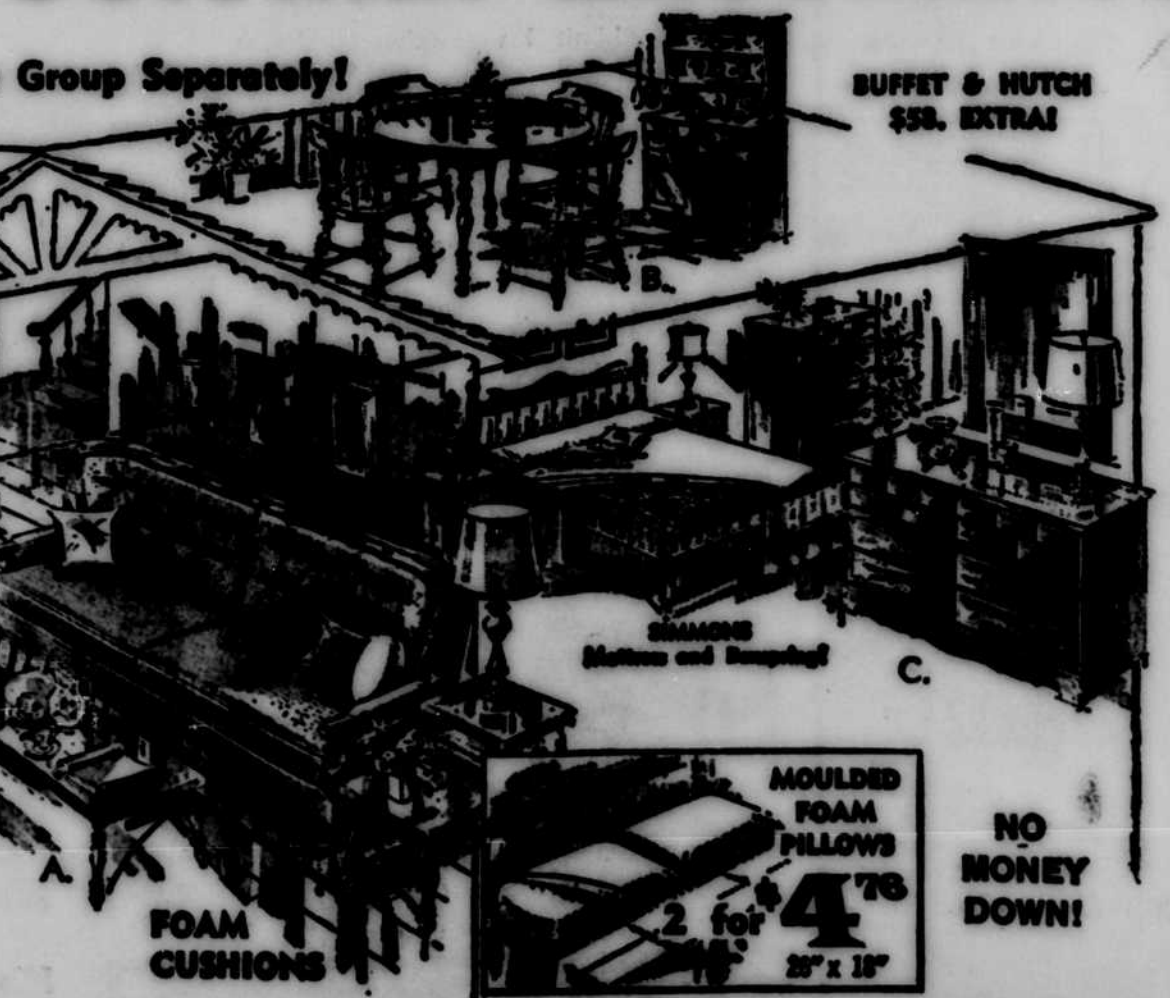
