GREENSBORO—Mrs. William S. Joyner, of Chapel Hill, president of the UNC-G Alumni Association, has made known the names of alumnae who have been chosen members of 11 district committees of the Katherine Smith Reynolds Scholarships.

The 11 committees now have received the names of 275 high school girls who are to be screened by districts for the final scholarship competition in Greensboro on March 5 and 6. Twenty-four girls will be in the final competition, two from each district and two others from Forsyth, Stokes, or Surry County competing for one special scholarship in chemistry. Twelve will be selected.

Each Reynolds scholarship is worth \$1,200 a year, renewable for four years. This will be the third group of 12 freshmen to receive the awards. There are now 21 Reynolds Scholarship holders on the campus. Next year there will be 36 and the following year 48. The scholarships were established by the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation of Winston-Salem in honor of the wife of R. J. Reynolds, founder of the Reynolds Tobacco Company. She was an alumna of Woman's College.

Dr. Anne L. Anderson, Greensboro, chairman of the Reynolds Scholarship Central Committee since its establishment, is moving to Chapel Hill and Miss Sadye Dunn, UNC-G dean of women, a committee member, will succeed her as chairman. Miss Marguerite Felton and Mrs. Margery D. Braswell are two additional faculty appointments to the committee.

The scholarship district committee chairmen and members include Mrs. Aubrey Mauney of Kings Mountain, representing District 10.
