No matter how it is pronounced or where it is said, "Thinking Day" has a special significance to Girl Scouts.

Girls learn early in their scouting that theirs is a world of friendship. They share the same ideals to God and country with five and a half million girl and adults in 67 countries. Members of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

Special days are set aside for all of these countries for emphasis on international friendship.

Kings Mountain Girl Scouts will note International Friendship Day, "Thinking Day", Tuesday night with a special program at 7:30 p.m. at First Presbyterian church.

Each Kings Mountain troop will represent a country of the World Association of Girl Scouts and Girl Guides with songs, dances and skits. Thinking Day annually honors the birth dates of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting and Guiding, and Lady Baden-Powell, World Chief Guide. Among Girl Scouts and Guides everywhere, Thinking Day is a special time for troops around the world to think of each other and focus their activities around international friendship.

To Juliette Gordon Low, founder and first president of Girl Scouts of the United States of America, world friendship was a practical goal which people work for and achieve. As Girl Scouts prepare to celebrate Girl Scout Week, March 7 through 13, they are reminded of their founder's last letter to them in which she wrote "something very dear to me." Ours is a circle of friendship united by our ideals."

Charleston Gardens Open To Tourists

Charleston's Famous Gardens opened to the public Monday.

Perhaps the most noted tourist attractions in the Southeast, the three gardens—Magnolia, Middleton Place and Cypress—offer a marked variety of beauty. Middleton Place, which lies off the scenic highway between Charleston and Summerville, is a magnificent formal garden along the banks of the Ashley River. It has been compared favorably with the finest formal gardens in England and on the Continent, and each year attracts thousands of visitors. This garden is the only one of the three, which remains open year 'round.

Middleton Place, which devoted some 65 acres to landscaped beauty, pre-dates the American Revolution. Begun in 1741, the garden was the creation of the then owner, Henry Middleton, who was to become president of the Continental Congress. A hundred slaves worked 10 years to complete the formal terraces, walks and ornamental waterways that are so skillfully blended with coastal forest, river vistas and marshlands.

Magnolia Gardens lack the formality of Middleton Place and gain loveliness in the wild abandon of a myriad of flowers and shrubs. Offering the greatest collection and variety of camelias in the country, Magnolia each year draws botanists both from the United States and abroad.

Paths, flanked by flaming azaleas, wind in a breathtaking maze along the banks of the Ashley and beside pools that reflect the glimmer of the flowers.

Magnolia Gardens, too, lies off the scenic Summerville route. Cypress Gardens held stunning contrast to the other two. Here the trees that gave the showplace its name, rise eerily out of ink-black waters, their limbs festooned with Spanish moss that shades perhaps the most spectacular display of azaleas in the Lowcountry.

The city-owned gardens offer the visitor opportunity to view its beauties, not only from winding trails, but from small paddle boats that ply through its many lagoons and canals. Formerly owned by the Kiltredge family, Cypress Gardens was a gift to the City of Charleston. It is situated off Highway 52, north of the city.

Each of Charleston's Famous Gardens is within easy driving distance of the metropolitan area.
