John H. Harris, extension horticulture specialist from North Carolina State college, will speak to Cleveland County Garden clubs in a program arranged by the Shelby Junior Women's club Tuesday at 10 a.m. at the county office building on Post road.

Women from Kings Mountain garden clubs are invited to attend, Mrs. Stough Wray, Jr., conservation department chairman of the sponsoring club, said yesterday.

Mr. Harris will use the subject, "Care of Shrubs." An open discussion period will be held at the conclusion of his program.

Harris, better known throughout North Carolina as "The Tar Heel Gardener," is in charge of extension horticulture at North Carolina State College.

Since he joined the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service in 1938, few people have done more than John Harris to improve the landscaping of North Carolina homes and businesses.

Through his adult education work in Extension he is constantly gathering and disseminating information that will help Tar Heel homeowners improve their surroundings.

He works through county extension agents. He has published many circulars and bulletins. His weekly newspaper column "The Tar Heel Gardener" is one of the most popular articles of its type in the state. He also has a weekly radio program of the same name. He is landscape editor of "The Progressive Farmer." He is in constant demand as a speaker, and the Harris home in Raleigh is a showplace for Capital City visitors.

A native of Chatham County, Harris is a 1937 graduate of State college, receiving his B.S. degree in landscape architecture. He worked for one year as superintendent of city parks in Greensboro.

Harris is a member of Alpha Zeta, national honorary agricultural fraternity, Sigma Chi, American Society for Horticultural Science, member of Edenton Street Methodist Church (past chairman of official board) and teacher of Sunday School class for past 14 years.

He and his wife, the former Rachel Stone, reside in Raleigh. They are the parents of two children.
