birthday as well as other members of her family.
Mrs. Taylor has never voted. She says she remembers her mother telling her that she (Mattie) was born in the year the slaves were set free. The most exciting time of her life, she recalls, was when she and another young girl ran off to Kings Mountain (about 12 miles from their home) "Because the girl and Mama didn't get along. Mama came and got me."
"I'm pretty well satisfied," Mrs. Taylor said Monday afternoon as she prepared to eat a birthday supper with her daughter. A pink birthday cake was cut and served with ice cream.
Mrs. Taylor received birthday greetings from Victor Christgarr, executive director of the Social Security Administration, via a letter brought to her by the Social Security field representative, John Darling, of the Gastonia office.
The letter read, "It gives me great pleasure to send you birthday greetings and my personal wishes for a happy second century of life. May your path ahead be smooth and may peace and contentment be your companions as you continue on your journey."

Mrs. Taylor applied as a dependent parent under the Social Security program December 14, 1966. An amendment to the Social Security Law in August 1961 upped her benefits to \$82.50, a check she receives each month. She qualified as a dependent parent because a son, Harvey Taylor, now deceased, was employed by a laundry in New York. His mother had not remarried.
Mrs. Taylor is mother of nine children, three of whom are living. All of Kings Mountain, they are Mrs. Bertha Taylor Reed, Mrs. Emma Taylor Wilson and Clyde Taylor. She has 27 grandchildren, 41 great-grandchildren and nine great-great-grandchildren.
Besides her love for sweets, another luxury Mattie Taylor practices is sleeping late. Her family disturbed her late-sleeping habit Sunday by scheduling a family picture-taking session. She had to dress (complete with stockings) for the event and move from her chair by the window to a sofa.
Her son offered to assist his mother, but she preferred walking unassisted to the sofa where she had her picture snapped several times with various members of the family.
She was typically feminine about her age. "You mean I've got to tell how old I am in print," she said.

Fag Thieves Still Uncaught

Police Chief Paul Sanders said Wednesday no arrests have been made in last week's Winn-Dixie theft, in which thieves made off with \$2,000 in cigarettes.
Recent rains tended to connect the robbery with several subsequent ones being investigated by county officers in which cigarettes seemed the desired merchandise.
One victim found his roof to be leaking, and investigation showed holes had been drilled in the roof. Officers speculate the thieves were interrupted in their work to gain entry as at Winn-Dixie, later managed entry by other means.
A juvenile picked up for questioning here, admitting he had been stealing occasional cartons of cigarettes from Winn-Dixie and selling them, but clearly provided proof he was a one-carton thief, not the big-haul thief. Chief Sanders said Wednesday.
