**Heart Disease** No. 1 Killer

CHAPEL HILL - The safest state to live in as far as your heart is concerned, may be New Mexico, although it might be saf er yet to turn the clock back to 1900. At any rate, North Caro-lina's death rate from the "Red Plague" (heart and blood vessel disease), as Governor Dan Moore recently put it, isn't the kind of thing Chambers of Commerce would brag about.

A national report shows that 54 states have a lower death rate from heart disease and stroke than North Carolina, the North Carolina Heart Association an nounces. Among other facts disclosed:

-The United States has the highest death rate from cardio-vascular diseases of any coun-try in the world, and North Car-olina's rate is well above the na-

tional average. —Among the states of the Union, South Carolina ranks highest in cardiovascular death rate, North Carolina ranks 6th, New Mexico lowest.

--Non-whites have a higher cardiovascular death rate than whites in all age groups except the oldest (75 and above). This is true even though white males experience higher death rates from heart attacks than nonwhites.

At age 50, one out of every hundred white males develops coronary disease during the course of a year. -In 1900 cardiovascular dis

eases accounted for 20 percent of all deaths in the U.S. Today claiming nearly a million lives annually in the U.S., including 21,090 in North Carolina.

These and other data on death and illness from heart and blood vessel diseases appear in "Car-diovascular Diseases in the U.S.: Facts and Figures," a 32-page statistical handbook just published by the American Heart Association, with which the state group is affiliated, in cooperation with the National Heart Intion with the National Heart In-stitute and the Heart Disease Control Program of the U.S. Pub-lic Health Service. The ranking of states accord-ing to cardiovascular disease dath for data for

death rates is based on data for white males, ages 45-64, averaged for 1959-61. (The use of a rate based on a single age-sex-color is necessary to allow for the great variability of populations in the different states.) On this basis, South Carolina has a rate of 933.9 deaths per 100,000 pop-ulation as compared with 522.4 for New Mexico, The North Car-olina rate is 873.5.




