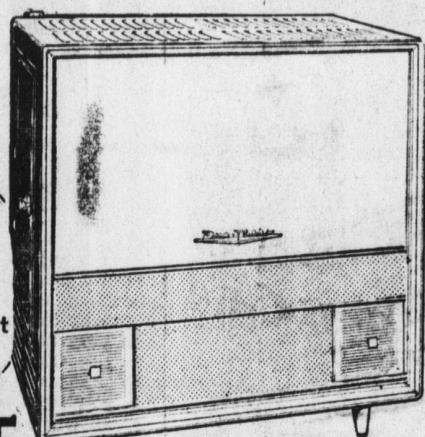

**Mrs. Cheshire Heads Drive For Erskine**

ROCK HILL, S. C. — Erskine College President J. M. Lesesne, addressing Erskine Towers Club (special gifts) chairman meeting here at the Elks Club Friday night to launch the 1965-66 Erskine Living Endowment Campaign, stated that the essential role played by the Living Endowment in recent years must be continued if Erskine is to meet the increasing educational challenges of the years ahead.

Dr. Lesesne particularly emphasized that funds from the federal government cannot take the place of Living Endowment support. Alumni and friends of Erskine help provide current operating funds for the college through the Living Endowment, which has earned Erskine four national awards from the American Alumni Council.

Seventy-one per cent of all Erskine alumni supported the college last year with gifts totaling \$112,128. Continued outstanding support from alumni and friends through the Living Endowment figures prominently in Erskine's budget projection through 1970 and its development plans for the 1965-75 decade, especially in its plans to raise faculty salaries substantially.

Attending the meeting in Rock Hill were Towers Club chairmen from Gastonia, Kings Mountain, Charlotte, and Statesville, N. C., and from Chaster, Clover, Columbia, Lancaster, Rock Hill, and Fort Mill, S. C.

Ray Witsa, of Abbeville, Towers Club chairman of the 1965-66 campaign, introduced and instructed campaign chairmen and workers.

The general solicitations phase of the annual alumni fund drive was scheduled to open Saturday, September 11, in Due West with a workshop for chapter and division chairmen conducted by Everette Carson of Gastonia, N. C., overall chairman of the 1965-66 Living Endowment; Mrs. Winnie M. Phillips, Erskine alumni director; and Dr. Lesesne.

General solicitations chairmen were to be instructed on campaign procedures and the challenge gift that has been offered to the 194 towns and at-large groups within Erskine's 44 alumni chapters. Each of these has been challenged to equal either their last year's participation record or that of their chapter, whichever is higher. Each town meeting the challenge will earn an extra \$50 for the Living Endowment. Those attaining 100

per cent participation will earn \$100 for the campaign. The total challenge gift could reach \$13,000. Eighty-three towns and at-large groups must reach 100 per cent in order to claim challenge gifts, indicating the high standards set by the 1964-65 campaign, in which 26 different alumni chapters topped 90 per cent participation.

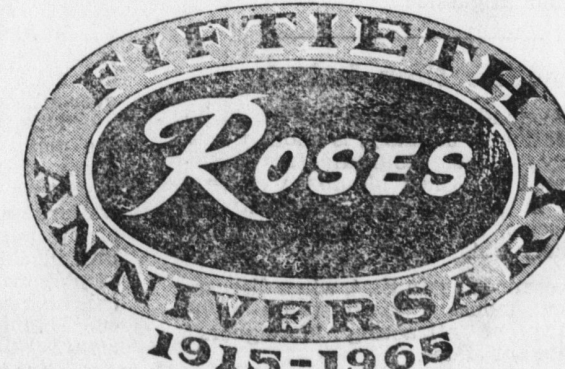
