Miller Charged After Accident Monday Night

Ralph Lee Miller of Grover was charged with a stop sign violation following an accident at the intersection of East Gold Street and Battleground Avenue Monday around 9 p.m.

Miller was driving a 1961 Dodge ambulance owned by the Grover Rescue Squad and was on his way to the Kings Mountain Hospital when the accident occurred.

Miller told investigating officers Joe Harmon and William Roper that he was about 50 or 75 feet from the light when it changed to red and that he could not get stopped in time to avoid hitting a 1955 model Ford driven by Ronny Roberts, 19, of the Midpines community.

Roberts was attempting to make a left turn from East Gold onto South Battleground when the Rescue Squad vehicle struck the front end of the car, careened off it, went across the railroad tracks, knocked down a stop sign at the intersection of West Gold and Railroad Avenue, hit a telephone pole and finally came to a stop in the parking lot of Ware's Mill.

Police estimated that the ambulance traveled 336 feet after impact.

Charles P. Hawkins, 47, of Gastonia, who was a passenger in the ambulance and Judy Roberts, nine, of Kings Mountain, who was a passenger in the Ford, sustained minor injuries and were treated at Kings Mountain hospital.

Damage to the ambulance was estimated at \$300 and damage to the Ford was estimated at \$985. Damage to the stop sign was reported at \$10.
