

"Skip Row" Will Result In High Yields

North Carolina cotton growers can still realize the advantages of skip row planting in 1966 despite a tightening of regulations which place a greater burden on available cropland.

Under the new rules farmers planting in skip row will be charged with 30 per cent more land planted than in 1965. This applies to the most commonly used skip row patterns such as 2x1 or 2x2. The 4x4 pattern will not be affected.

Last year a farmer could plant in a 2x2 pattern with the land area measured as 50 per cent planted and 50 per cent unplanted. Next year he will be charged with 66% planted and 33% unplanted.

"This will virtually rule out skip row planting for the farmer who has very limited cropland," explains Glenn Toomey, extension cotton specialist at North Carolina State University at Raleigh.

"But the farmer who has enough idle land to absorb this increase caused by the change in regulations can profit by planting in skip row."

Toomey added, however, that skip row planting is not desirable in every situation. "Skip row patterns are advantageous only on land that produces large cotton plants with heavy foliage. There is little or no advantage in planting in skip row on land with a history of producing small plants."

The advantages of skip patterns are the roominess that allows more sunlight in through heavy foliage and the freedom for roots to grow and reach plant nutrients and moisture.

"Skip row will result in higher yields on land with a high potential or on land with a history of growing large plants," Toomey asserted.

This was shown in research plots at the Piedmont Agricultural Research Station in Rowan County last season. Solid planted cotton produced 620 pounds per acre; the 2x1 pattern produced 705 pounds; and the 2x2 pattern produced 865 pounds.

Each of these plots received nitrogen at the rate of 40 pounds per acre applied as sidedressing. With 60 pounds the solid planted

yielded 710 pounds, and with 80 pounds of nitrogen it grew 790 pounds.

With 60 pounds of N sidedressing the 2x1 produced 780 pounds, and with 80 pounds of N it was 815 pounds. In the 2x2 with 60 pounds of N the yield was 1,180 pounds of cotton per acre.

You can get your daily supply of vitamin C from a choice of many citrus fruits. The California-Arizona navel orange crop is the largest since 1947. There are more eating oranges coming out of Florida than usual at this

time of year. The Florida seedless grapefruit crop is estimated at 24 million boxes.

And, of course, many delicious apples are on the market. The supply is down two per cent from last year's huge harvest but 11 per cent above average.

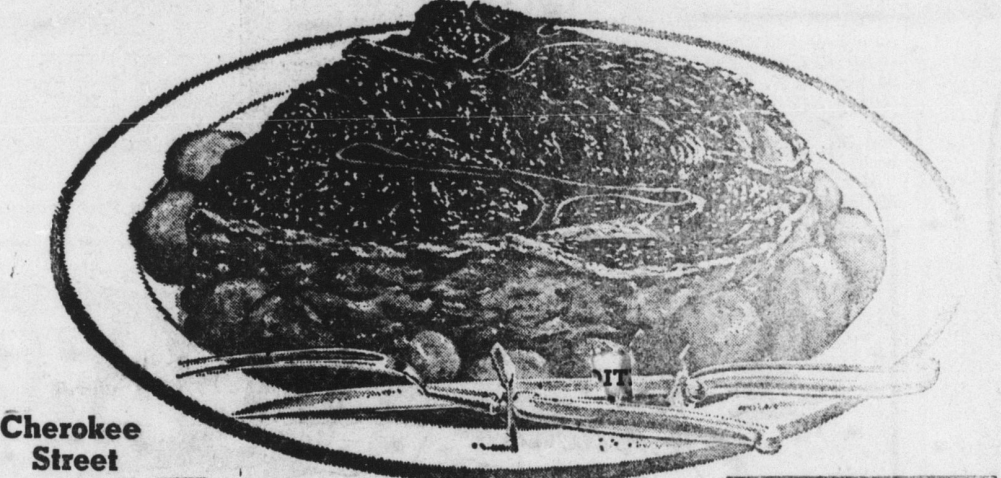
