Urban Renewal Survey Starts

Traffic and Planning Associates, of Hickory, has been retained by the Downtown Development committee to submit a Survey and Planning application to the federal Urban Renewal Agency, for loans and funds to conserve and redevelop the central business district.

Ralph J. Haigler, the firm's chief planning technician, is already begun an advance survey of the business district, from which he will compile data for the application to the federal agency.

The firm is also conducting a traffic study, in connection with the survey, in an effort to implement of orderly flow of traffic in the business district and other congested areas.

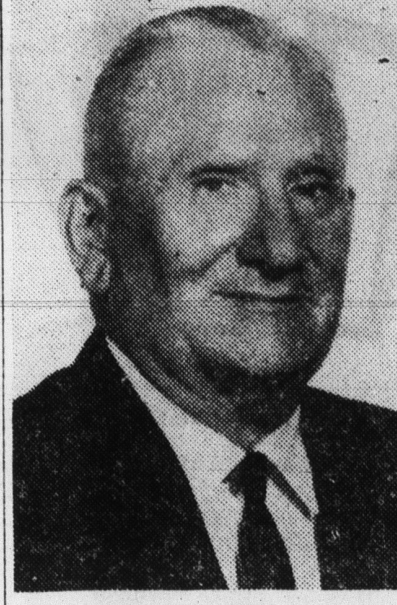
