Hospital Week Starts Sunday

Kings Mountain hospital admitted 3,649 patients during 1965—an increase of 144 over the previous year—and 479 babies were born.

These statistics were reported by Administrator Grady Howard this week as the local institution joins in the nation-wide observance of Hospital Week, beginning Sunday.

Kings Mountain hospital opened its doors, a 24-bed institution—on April 2, 1951. In the 15-year period, the hospital has grown, first to 36 beds, then to 50 and subsequently to a 75 bed plant with a new nurses' home. A projected 25-bed addition estimated to cost \$500,000 has been voted by Kings Mountain citizens.

Administrator Howard said that the hospital's percentage of occupancy is 92.21 and the percentage of patients over 65 is 9.59. Average length of stay is seven days. The hospital employs a staff of 106.

Average number of patients per day is 71, said Mr. Howard. He noted that 101 patients died during 1965.

The infant birth rate is up by 23 from the previous year.

National Hospital Week, May 8-14, is built around the May 12th birthday of Florence Nightingale, the famous nurse crusader. It was through her efforts that the early hospital schools of nursing were established.

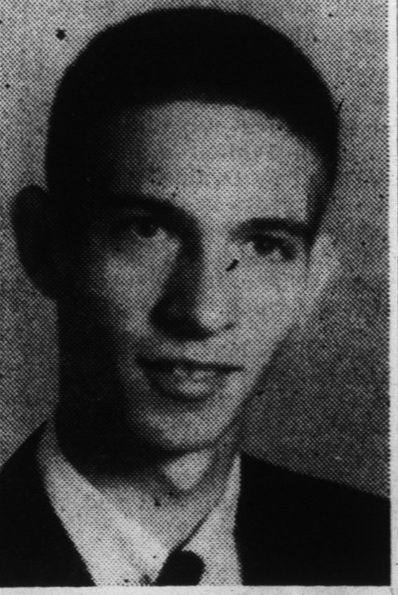
