Camp Rotary will open for its 28th season of established camping on June 19 and will operate for four consecutive sessions, ending on August 12. Scouts from

the Pioneer Council are offered a unique opportunity for fun, learning, and adventure in an out-of-doors setting during the four 13-day sessions of camp.

At Girl Scout Camp many and varied activities contribute to the growth, development, and education of girls. Through carefully planned activities in the out of doors, Scouts gain knowledge and respect for careful use of nature's resources. They learn respect of the good earth which, if not eroded and distorted, will sustain their future lives.

Scouts also learn the give and take of community living and the

understanding of their fellow men. This knowledge is important to girls if they are to live peacefully in the crowded world of the future.

Emphasis is also put on the spiritual and the physical well-being of campers. In recognition of the fact that all knowledge is fruitless without energy to put it to use, the physical well-being of Scouts is enhanced with hiking, boating, swimming, tennis, archery, and other outdoor sports.

Patrolmen To Chapel Hill

RALEIGH — Seventy young men will attend the State Highway Patrol basic schools at Chapel Hill this spring and summer. Upon completion of 14 weeks of intensive training, fifty of them will be sworn into the patrol and most if not all of the remainder will do patrol office work until vacancies occur.

One of the schools begins May 22 and another on July 3, with some overlapping.

Addition of the 50 new troopers will bring the patrol strength to 750.

Students are given intensive instructions in a wide range of subjects from accident investigation, chemical testing, defensive tactics on through to pursuit driving and traffic laws. In all, they study 63 different subjects and are given instructions in operation of their vehicles under many conditions.

The school Commandant this summer will be Sgt. M. C. Byrum of Elkin, assisted by Corporal J. F. Cardwell of Washington, Lt. R. F. Williamson is liaison with Patrol Headquarters.

Every trooper now on duty attended a similar school before he joined the patrol and each of them spends three days a year in refresher courses or special training.

The first patrol school was held at Camp Glenn near Morehead City when the patrol was founded in 1929. The 23 who were graduated that year were assigned to motorcycles. Now the troopers use high speed specially equipped automobiles.

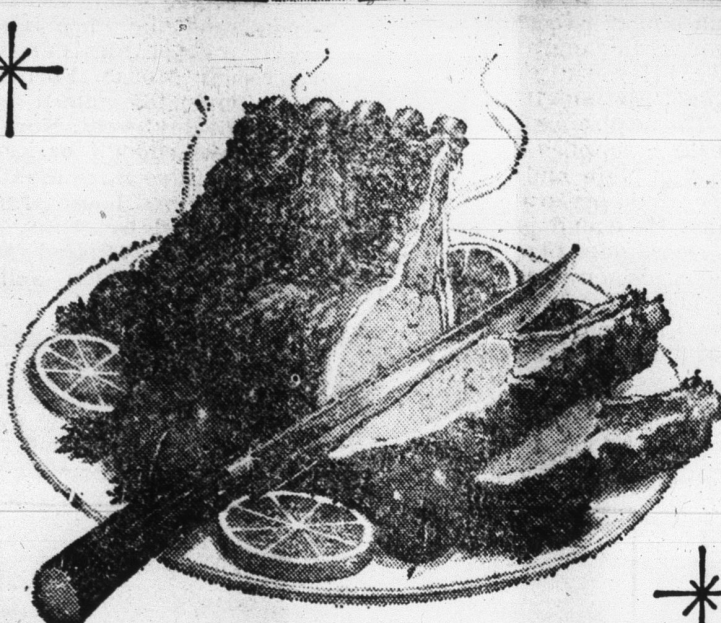
