

Dairy Farms Set Open House

June is Dairy Month and Cleveland County dairy farmers are especially anxious to welcome visitors to their farms during the month.

This year, as a part of the Cleveland County June Dairy Month activities, four dairy farms will be open to the public during the week of June 12 through June 18 according to Roy Cochran, chairman of the Dairy Farm Tour Committee.

Dairies welcoming visitors during this week are Blanton Jersey Farms on Highway 74 West of Shelby, Roy Cochran Dairy near Swainsville, Max and Paul Grig Dairy between Lawndale and Casar, and the R. L. and Bill Plonk Dairy of Route 1, Kings Mountain.

These dairy farms will extend a special welcome at any time during the day, however after noon milking hours are usually between 3:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. when visitors will have an opportunity to observe the milking operation. This will give the visitor a chance to see how milk is removed from the cow by machine and then transported by pipelines to a bulk tank where the milk is cooled and held until picked up by the truck.

Other interesting features to observe will include calf barns, loafing barns, silos and feeding areas, machinery and more. Also, dairy refreshments will be served at each farm. "So make plans to visit one of these modern dairies during the week of June 12 through June 18", Mr. Cochran said.
