Church Weddings Here Unite Robinsons, Carsons, Blantons

Six o'clock rites Saturday evening in Bethlehem Baptist church united Miss Beverly Lee Herndon and William Alvin Robinson in marriage.

The Rev. Gaston Camp of Mooresboro, uncle of the bride, heard the couple pledge vows of the double-ring ceremony.

Mrs. N. F. McGill, Sr. was organist for the program of nuptial music and Jacob Dixon was vocal soloist.

Palms and seven-branched candelabra decorated the choir loft of the church sanctuary. Two brass tree candelabra interspersed with ferns and palms were used on either side of the altar and a large central arrangement of all-white mums and glads were in the center. Completing the setting was a white wrought-iron prayer bench at which the couple knelt for the benediction.

Organ program included "Arioso" by Handel; Bach's "Sheep May Safely Graze"; "Panis Angelicus" by Franck; "Intermezzi" by Mascagni; "Meditation from Thais" by Massenet; Schubert's "Ave Maria"; and "O Perfect Love" by Barnby. She also played the traditional wedding marches from Lohengrin by Wagner and Mendelssohn.

Mr. Dixon sang "Entreat Me Not to Leave Thee" by Gounod before the entrance of the bridal party and "The Crimand" (The Lord's My Shepherd) by Mueller just before the exchange of vows. He sang "Wedding Prayer" by Dunlap as the benediction. Broadus Pinkney Herndon escorted his daughter to the altar and gave her in marriage. The bride's formal gown was designed of silk organza and imported white Chantilly lace. Fashioned with empire bodice featuring a bateau neckline and elbow-length sleeves, the dress was highlighted by pearl-trimmed lace motifs applied around the neckline and on the gored skirt which

spread to a Chapel train. Her triple-tier bouffant veil of imported silk illusion was attached to a matching lace pillbox and blush veil and she carried a cascade bouquet of white gladiolus, fringed carnations and stephanotis centered by a white orchid.

Their A-line skirts were enhanced by gathered fullness to the back. Their matching hair bows were dropped with tulle veils and they wore dyed-to-match satin slippers and carried double rings wrapped in gold satin to match their dresses with gold mums cascading from them.
