### Safety Features Of Chevy Truck

Fifteen safety-related product improvements will be added to the 1967 Chevrolet truck line as standard equipment, E. M. Estes, general manager, announced today.

Most of the items will be on the conventional light and medium duty models which represent at least 80 per cent of Chevrolet truck volume, Estes said. Exceptions will be principally on low-volume models because of variations in body type or structural differences.

The lineup of protective devices includes:

1. Dual master cylinder brake system with warning light.
2. Four-way hazard flasher.
3. Energy-absorbing steering wheel of deep-center design.
4. Telescoping lower steering shaft.
5. Energy-absorbing instrument panel with smooth contoured knobs and levers.
6. Padded instrument panel.
7. Padded sun visors.
8. Folding front seat back latch.
9. Inside day-night mirror with shatter-resistant vinyl-edged glass.
10. Thicker laminate windshield glass.
11. Barrier-type cab rear window mounting.
12. Lane change feature incorporated in directional signal control.
13. Positive interior push button door locks.
14. Class A turn signals, which meet I.C.C. requirements for lens area and luminosity.
15. Soft low profile window control knobs.

Mrs. W. L. Logan was welcomed as a new member.

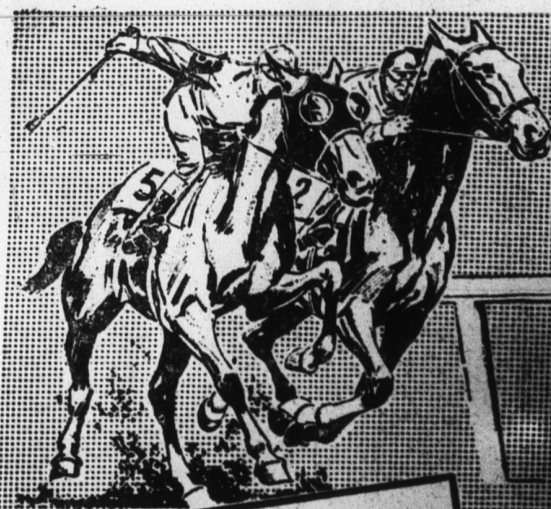
