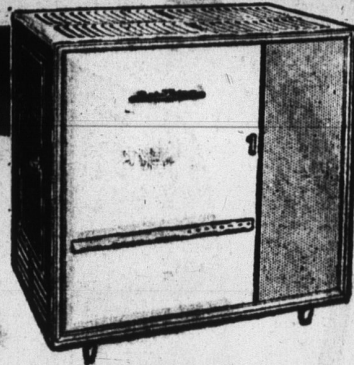

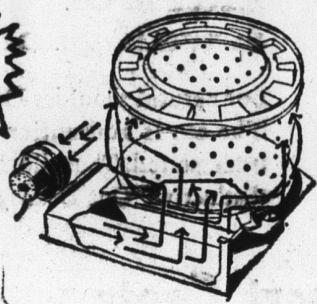

State, and especially in our mountains.

Should you need a little prod-
ding to convince you, I would
suggest that you select a section
of the Blue Ridge Parkway be-
tween Fancy Gap, Virginia, and
Clingman's Dome in the Great
Smoky Mountains. You will be
rewarded beyond measure by the
beauty that unfolds before your
eyes as you round each curve in
the highway; or capture the
views from the many parking
overlooks.

To understand the reasons for
fall coloration in the leaves, we
must go to the plants themselves
and find out what makes the
color in the first place. It is com-
plicated but perhaps we can
simplify enough to be under-
stood.

Leaves are the manufacturing
centers for plant food and they
are green because they contain
chlorophyll. It is the chlorophyll
which manufactures the sugars
which supply the food essential
for plant growth.

These sugars are manufactur-
ed in the leaves during bright
sunny days and are distributed
throughout the plant by a maze
of pipes and tubes, made up of
many different kinds of cells.
The most rapid manufacture
takes place during the spring
and summer months when the
light intensity is greatest and
the days are longer.

In the early fall, the days be-
come shorter and night tempera-
tures begin to dip. When this
happens the sugars are not moved
around in the plant, as they
were under higher temperatures
and longer days, but become trapped
in the leaves and build up
rapidly.

This is the signal which trig-
gers a slowing down of the man-
ufacture of chlorophyll as it is
destroyed in the leaf faster than
it is produced.

When this happens the leaves
lose their green color and other
pigments, which have been mask-
ed by the chlorophyll, intensify-
ing the leaves and accounting for
the beautiful coloration in our
fall foliage.

SWISS STEAK
NECTARINE
1 1/2 to 2 lbs. flank or skirt
steak
4 tablespoons dry onion
soup mix
3 tablespoons water
4 to 6 fresh scallions
Cut steak into 6 or 8 serv-
ing pieces. Brown in skillet.
Place in shallow baking pan.
Sprinkle with dry soup mix;
add water. Cover with foil and
bake in 325 degree (moder-
ate) oven 45 minutes. Slice
scallions to make 3 cups; ar-
range over steak. Bake, cover-
ed, 15 minutes longer. Makes
6 to 8 servings.
